Ratepayers Protest Dumping Sewerage In Whitchurch Twp.

A petition signed by fifty-three ratepayers of the Township of Whitchurch was presented to council on Thursday evening protesting the possible dumping of sewage waste on certain farms in the municipality. Council after brief discussion agreed that the matter should be dealt with by the Health Unit.
A second petition was brought before council from ratepayers of Oak Ridges requesting regular municipal garbage collection for the area. Council took no immediate action on the request.
The resignation was received of D. O. Preston, grader operator. A request from a wrecking concern that they be allowed to establish a wrecking yard on the Ballantrae sideroad was declined as the area has been built up extensively during recent years with residences.
Much time in the meeting dealt with routine council matters. Council agreed to accept the offer of the Toronto Star to place road signs at all concession and sideroad intersections. Some 400 signs will be required. Reeve P. S. Legge was named chairman of the Road Committee in the absence of councillor Delos Graham who is seriously ill.
L. J. Harper Resigns
The resignation of L. J. Harper, assistant to the clerk, was received and accepted, effective May 31st. Mr. Harper had previously requested an increase in salary of \$200, which was declined. He is a one-time councillor for the municipality and has been on the staff for the past seven years.
