Some time ago, Mr. Griffin, operator of the tavern, known formally as the Rouge Valley Inn, agreed to pay \$1,000 per year for five years plus the donation of gravel, in order that the road might be repaired. To date, the Township has not received the amount promised.

"It's a pretty sloppy piece of Township business," stated Councillor Mrs. Jean McPherson. "I'm certainly not in favor of the municipality providing a road to a 'booze place.'"

Reeve W. G. Newman explained that others were benefitting by work done on the road. "It's always been a hard piece of road to keep up," he said.

Claremont Man Pulls Fisherman from Lake

Mr. Eddie Ortiz, an employee at Sarco in Claremont, rescued a fisherman from Orr Lake, 20 miles north of Barrie, on Saturday after their small boat capsized. Harold Tarves, 42, of Burlington, drowned. His body was recovered an hour later.

Mr. Ortiz and his nephew Fern of Toronto were fishing in the middle of the lake when they noticed a red fuel can in the water. They quickly directed their boat toward the can to find one man clinging desperately

Weather Plagues Vegetable Growers in Ontario County

Ontario County farmers recovering from drought-losses suffered last year, faced another battle with unseasonal weather this spring as frost nipped thousands of tomato plants over a wide area.

H. Lynn Fair, agricultural representative for Ontario county, said frost last week "almost certainly" wiped out tomato plants already in the ground.

The plants, grown in greenhouses, would not be hardy enough to withstand temperatures below freezing, Mr. Fair explained.

About 500 acres are planted with tomatoes in Ontario county, Mr. Fair said, and May 24 is the normal date to begin transplanting of seedlings.

All tomatoes grown in the county are sold to Campbell's Soup Ltd., Toronto, who sell the plants to farmers. Plants are flown in from southern U.S.A. If the Canadian supply is insufficient.

A spokesman for Campbell Soups Ltd. said Ontario County produced about 1,800 tons of tomatoes last year, with a total value to the farmers of almost \$58,000. He added that no estimate of damage to this year's crop could yet be obtained.

Mr. Fair said there might be a chance that plant roots might escape frost-damage, and shoot up new growth.

"But this would mean another waiting period," Mr. Fair explained. "It would be wiser for farmers to set new plants."

Poor spring weather has also held back growth of pastures scorched in the drought last summer, and hindered normal crop seeding.

Clover has been stunted, Mr. Fair said, and is about 2 weeks behind the average year. Very few farmers have finished their spring seeding, which is normally completed by May 10.

Mr. Fair said that maple trees indicated the unseasonal weather, being only just bursting their buds. In an average year, the maple trees are in full leaf by this date.

The Hans Geissberger farm near Hampton was one of the hardest hit by freezing temperatures. Hans Geissberger, Jr., said 20,000 tomato plants worth about \$200, will probably be ploughed under after the frost last week.

"Fortunately, we only had one-third of our crop in the ground," Mr. Geissberger said.

The Geissbergers expect to plant about 60,000 tomato plants this year.

Jim Robinson, field man for the Campbell Soup Station at Bowmanville, which provides plants for nearly all the 35

grewers in Southern Durham county and Southern Ontario county, said that the situation is not too desperate. "Only about eight growers were affected in my area," he said, "where most of the tomato growing is done."
