TRAVELLERS TELL OF INTERESTING TRIP

We left London yesterday in our Ford Consul, arriving here at 6 p.m. We are staying at a quaint little Inn, over 300 years old. Our rooms are comfortable and we have lovely meals. Tomorrow we will visit Blenheim Palace where Churchill was born and now the home of the Duke of Marlborough, a nephew of Churchill. The weather is still lovely. Enjoyed church this a.m. in a Methodist Church. Before the service we walked around the town, not as large as Stouffville but very old. Everyone who has a foot of ground has a garden.

Cambridge, May 15th — Visited Blenheim Castle—simply out of this world! Also went to Witney and through a Church 700 years old. Visited Stratford-on-Avon and Ann Hathaway's cottage—all most interesting. Spent the night at Alcester, a Roman Town built in 1641. Visited Warwick Castle. At Cambridge we are staying at "The Blue Boat" with Cambridge University just one block above us. Watched the boys boating on the river. For first time since our arrival, our room in the hotel is warm. I can't understand why there is a coal shortage here as none is burned in hotels—the heaters are electric and the money we put in them is the best investment yet.

Coffee is on the menu only for breakfast. This morning we couldn't get tea and none of us could recognize the faintest semblance of coffee—was like nothing ever tasted. No such thing as pie—just one with no crust on the bottom. The tea is wonderful and all in all we have had wonderful meals.

May 16th — Skegness — Another wonderful day! We expected rocky country but it is absolutely flat, not even rocks on the seashore. Passed through many large apple orchards and hundreds of fields of tulips. Visited Newmarket (races on there this week) then on to Ely and through the Cathedral there. It was started in 1083 and completed in 1500. Had lunch at Lamb Hotel and tea at Bull's Neck. At night we enjoyed a walk down to the dock and the North Sea.

The roads in England are winding and signs read, "Bend Ahead" and a "lay by" is a place to pull off the road and rest and eat.

I imagine the National debt is being reduced if the tips we give can be used as a guide. I think they deliberately hold back on shillings and 6s so we have to give a bigger tip.

We cannot help but marvel at the cleanliness of England. Roads, parks, streets—no litter anywhere and hotel rooms spotlessly clean.

The London papers are not much larger than the Stouffville Tribune.

This weekend is Whitsun Holiday, a popular one in England. We are getting worried about night's lodgings so we may go on to Scotland to avoid it.

Dalkeith, Scotland

May 22

The air is so much clearer and purer, the sun shining brightly ever since we crossed the border although their language is a bit hard to understand. On Monday we changed our plans and instead of going to Whitby and north, went west through unbelievable high hills, grades and curves, stone fences all the way to Lake Windermere.

We went through Wm. Wadsworth's cottage. From Kendal we went through Carlisle (RAF station there) then on to the land of the heather, to Selkirk and to Abbotsford and Sir Wm. Scott's Castle and on to Melrose Abbey where Robt. Bruce's heart was buried in the 12th century. We are now close to Edinburgh and will visit it tomorrow.

Tuesday, May 23 — Still no rain. Reservoirs in cities getting low and restrictions on use of water. Drove to Edinburgh and shopped in a large store. Gar and I got our hair cut at a hair-dresser's—2.6 (31 cents) so it partly pays for the expense of the trip, except for the buying spree by the ladies. Edinburgh is a lovely city as is all Scotland we have seen. Am a bit disappointed, no oatmeal porridge but to day Haggis was on the menu. Drove out from Edinburgh and had an interesting talk with a foreman of a coal mine. The whole country is underlaid with coal. Here an Ironmonger Store is a Hardware. Soft Furnishings — curtains and drapes.

As we saw very little of Edinburgh today, we are giving it another day to-morrow.
