PROF. F. UNDERHILL TO CARLTON COLLEGE SENATE

Professor Frank H. Underhill, M.A., F.R.S.C., curator of Laurier House, was appointed to the Senate of Carleton College at a recent meeting of the college board of governors. A graduate of the University of Toronto and Oxford, Mr. Underhill was a professor of history at the universities of Saskatchewan and Toronto for many years. He was born in Stouffville, Ontario. The senate of Carleton College determines courses of study, including requirements for admission, and generally oversees all academic matters.

BARLEY CONTEST

The Barley Improvement Institute is offering \$1,000 in prizes for competition in the production of high yields of barley of desirable malting quality. There are two regional contests with ten prizes, starting at 100, for a first in each region. Region 1 is composed of all counties west and south of Simcoe and York. Region 2 includes all Northern Ontario Districts and all counties east of and including Simcoe and York. There is also a championship contest, with the first three from each region competing. Three prizes are given here — \$250; \$150; \$100. Awards are based on yield, field score, and seed score. Seed score is judged on the yield sample and on a bushel prepared for exhibition. Varieties eligible are Montcalm and O.A.C. 21. Minimum acreage required for the contest is five. Entries close on July 1, 1956. Regulations and entry forms are available from the office of your Agricultural Representative, or the Field Crops Branch, Ont. Dept. of Agriculture, Parliament Buildings, Toronto.

SAFE MILK

Pasteurization of milk and dairy products is the surest way the dairy industry has of making its products safe. The case for pasteurization is based on one point — pasteurization kills most disease producing bacteria found in milk. The use of pasteurized products is a vital step in protecting health, and is a real contribution to community welfare. The health inspector from the York County Health Unit regularly collects from local dairies samples of pasteurized milk and other milk products for testing and analyzing to ascertain whether or not due care has been exercised in the production, processing and handling of the milk and to see that the milk is free from adulterants.

A number of tests are carried out on milk and its products to determine bacterial content. Another test is done to indicate whether or not milk is properly pasteurized and its development is probably the greatest contribution to the safety of milk since the introduction of pasteurization itself. When you see the word "Pasteurized" on milk or milk products, you know that they have been pasteurized.

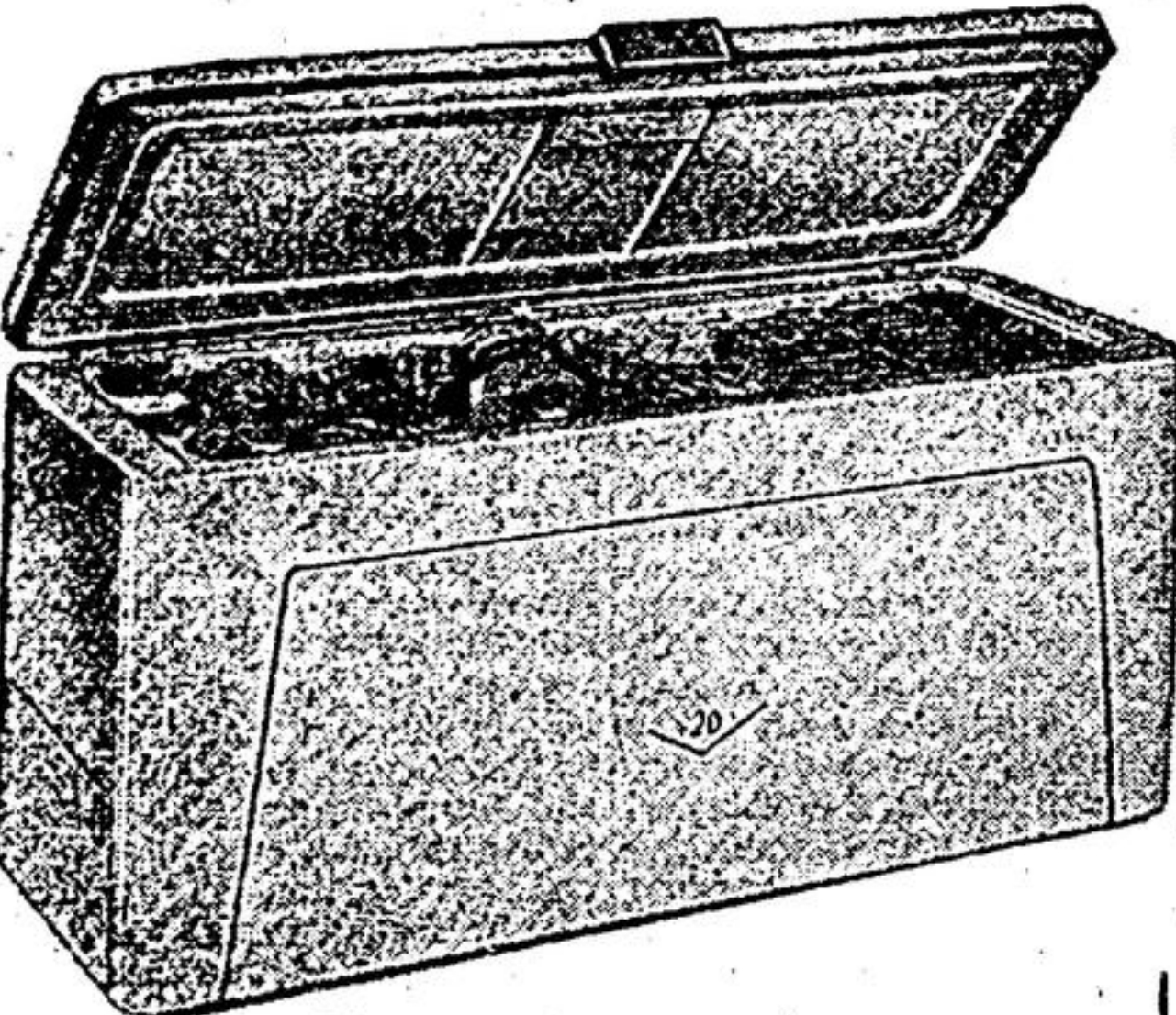
