

HANDICAPPED SWIMMERS LEARN FAST

"They try so hard to please me and to help each other," says the teacher of a swimming class at Edmonton. "I think that is why I find this class the most lovable group of children I've ever taught."

It's a swimming class, and the children can neither hear nor speak. Born deaf, they never learned to speak. The class is silent except for the usual stirring that goes with a group of children. There are no suppressed squeals, no whispers.

Teacher is Mrs. Mary Wiebe who has been a volunteer Red Cross swimming and water safety teacher of countless beginners. In the class this day were a dozen energetic beginners aged eight to 12, with juniors and advanced juniors learning to swim at the JWCA pool and learning it all by sign language.

Mrs. Wiebe's assistants at the pool—Evelyn Collins and Jean Ross—give instruction to 25 children from the provincial school for the deaf, one afternoon each week. Mrs. Collins teaches the juniors, children who can stay afloat, and Mrs. Ross looks after the advanced juniors, now becoming proficient swimmers.

ent in the crawl stroke. Mrs. Wiebe, once a competitive swimmer for her native state of Kansas—got as far as Olympic try-outs. She married hockey player Art Wiebe of the Chicago Black Hawks. She takes the 12 beginners.

None of the teachers knows the finger-sign language of the deaf. But Mrs. Wiebe's beginners, she says, broke a record—all learned to swim in four lessons.

Teacher's sparkling expression and her quick encouragement, with gestures by arms and feet, bring the youngsters along fast. She demonstrates the strokes, watches carefully while the youngsters struggle from one end of the pool to the other.

Help Each Other

"Of course, they were nervous at first, like any children in water for the first time," said Mrs. Wiebe. "You have to teach them confidence and there the Red Cross 'buddy' system helps."

The "buddy" system means 2 together, taking hands. The painstaking course is broken off for a 15-minute play time in which Mrs. Wiebe takes to the water with the children.
