Are you remembering the Strawberry Festival at Buttonville Hall on Wednesday, July 4th — with a play "His name

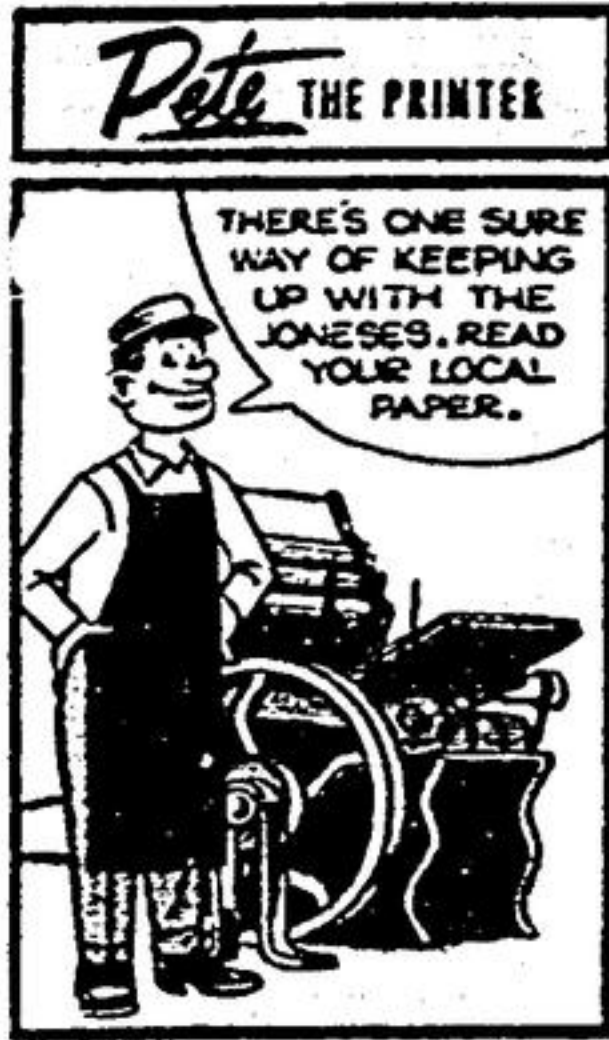
was Aunt Nellie" for entertainment?
