When County councillors, officials and their guests visited York Manor, they found a clean, bright, attractive building where an atmosphere of friendliness prevailed. The residents appeared happy and "at home."

It was a desperately hot day, but despite the heat the rooms with their high ceilings were cool and comfortable. Each dormitory has a fire escape and with each of these doors fully screened an additional source of fresh air was provided although the sleeping quarters have cross ventilation.

Visitors were welcomed by Reeves Edward Wrightman of Newmarket, and J. H. Anderson of Georgina. Deputy Reeve Albert Rutherford of Vaughan, and Mr. and Mrs. Peter Wilde. Since the superintendent's apartment had been completely renovated this year, with the old plaster having been removed and the surface covered with gyproc and plaster before it received its wallpaper or paint, the rooms had taken on the appearance of a private home rather than staff quarters in an institution.

The charge from the non-descript light brown paint which just a few years ago had covered every wall in the building, to the soft shades of green, pink and blue, completely alters the atmosphere of each room. The dreary, depressed feeling is gone and in its place is a cheerful, homey setting.

This year four dormitories in the women's wing have been redecorated and three bathrooms painted. It is not very long ago that there was only one bathtub for 35 women. Now there are three tubs and separate wash-rooms. Tiled floors and large mirrors add to the attractiveness of these rooms.

One corner that appealed to the women who toured the county's home for the aged was the shampoo alcove. It was equipped with a proper shampoo basin, electric dryer and comfortable chair.

A new concrete floor was laid this year in the staff dining room and covered with vinyl asbestos tile as were the floors of the male and female infirmaries. The dining room walls and ceiling were painted and here as elsewhere throughout the building, the addition of draperies and colorful framed prints had contributed to the homelike atmosphere.

Homespun spreads on each bed, lockers to hold their private possessions and covers on the window-sills helped to remove the institutional flavor from the dormitories. There are still not enough lockers for each person to have one for himself and the sunroom at the end of one of the men's dormitories remains unfurnished, but those are projects that will receive attention another year.

The tiled floors in the dormitory and the linoleum covering on the stairs make for easier cleaning as well as being more attractive. Mrs. Wilde said that eventually they plan to have all the dormitories covered with tiles.

The residents eat together in one dining room. Small tables with matching chairs in blond finish seat four. The kitchen is a big bright room in turquoise and white. Ample counter space and the addition of an electric dish washer and a coffee urn make it a satisfactory center for the nutritional work of the home. A well-stocked refrigerator room and pantry are close at hand.

When the visitors checked the menus for the week, many expressed a wish to remain there for dinner. The menus showed that a variety of dishes were being served providing the daily food requirements.

Finally, before leaving the building, the visitors inspected some of the residents' handiwork. One woman was busy quilting a "Dresden Plate" pattern. There were samples of stuffed toys, knitting, crocheting and novelty items.

Rocking chairs and upholstered sofas furnish the men's and women's lounges. The men's room doubles as a library.
