

Committee to Conserve Historical Heritage

Nine members of the Ontario Archaeological & Historic Sites Committee, set up by the Legislature to "conserve and develop Ontario's historical heritage" are in operation and have been for some weeks, in meetings at Queen's Park, Toronto. Their operations are directed voluntarily to present to the people of Ontario the "romance of Ontario's history", from the stone age Indian to the broad-axed pioneer farmer.

with a keen interest in Ontario's history, all are well versed in the subject. One of the two lady members of Ontario's Archaeological and Historic Sites Board is mayor of a fast growing small city — Mrs. Bernadette Smith of Woodstock. The second is a St. Thomas R.R. housewife, Mrs. J. R. Fitcher, past president of the province's network of 1495 Women's Institutes.

Among the male members are Prof. Thomas F. McIlwraith, University of Toronto anthropologist, archaeologist, and authority on Canada's West Coast Indians; Wilfrid W. Jury, curator of the University of Western Ontario's museum of Indian Archaeology and Pioneer Life at London, and one of the province's best known sifters of the soil; the Rev. John McCaffrey S.J., director of the world famous Martyrs' Shrine at Midland and historic Fort Ste. Marie; Dr. George Stanley of the Royal Military College, Kingston, author and authority on Canadian history; Prof. J. M. S. Careless, equally well known author and historian of the University of Toronto; Leslie Gray, London, Ont., dairy executive and past president of the Ontario Historical Society, and William H. Cranston, Midland, who as chairman of the board, is also local museum, president, newspaperman, and business official.

Not many results are yet evident of the work of this relatively new arm of the government whose budget is as small as its job is big, but they will soon be noted. Initial action was confined to advising the government on steps to be taken to guard important archaeological sites against depredation from over-enthusiastic but not too scientific diggers. Such excavations as are now sanctioned by the Board, and sometimes financially aided by the government, must be carried on by skilled archaeologists with regular reporting required on the results of their underground search for hidden history.

Now the Board, with the consent of the legislature, is broadening its field to include more informative marking of sites and buildings of provincial historical significance. Royal blue plaques with gold lettering will soon make their appearance and the plain "historic site ahead" markers of the Dept. of Highways are being replaced by signs which will carry full identification. It is no secret that Prime Minister Frost has been impressed with the historic site marking of some of the United States and is determined that what was formerly "Upper Canada" will not lag behind.

Application for Local Radio to be Heard

Plans were revealed this week for an application to the CBC Board of Governors to establish a day-time radio station in Richmond Hill. Present plans call for a 250 watt station operating from dawn to dusk from studios located in Richmond Hill. A company, to be known as Radio Richmond Hill Limited, is being formed by district business men headed by Mr. John Graham and Mr. Stewart Crawford of Scarborough, who will be in charge of actual broadcast operations.

The station will stress a local public and sales service to the many communities of the Central and Northern portion of York County, such as Richmond Hill, Thornhill, Stouffville, Markham, Aurora, Newmarket and Woodbridge. Programming plans call for an emphasis on local news and community activities. The next CBC Board of Governors Meeting will be held in September, when the application will be heard. At that time, evidence of community support and the need for a local radio service will be examined.



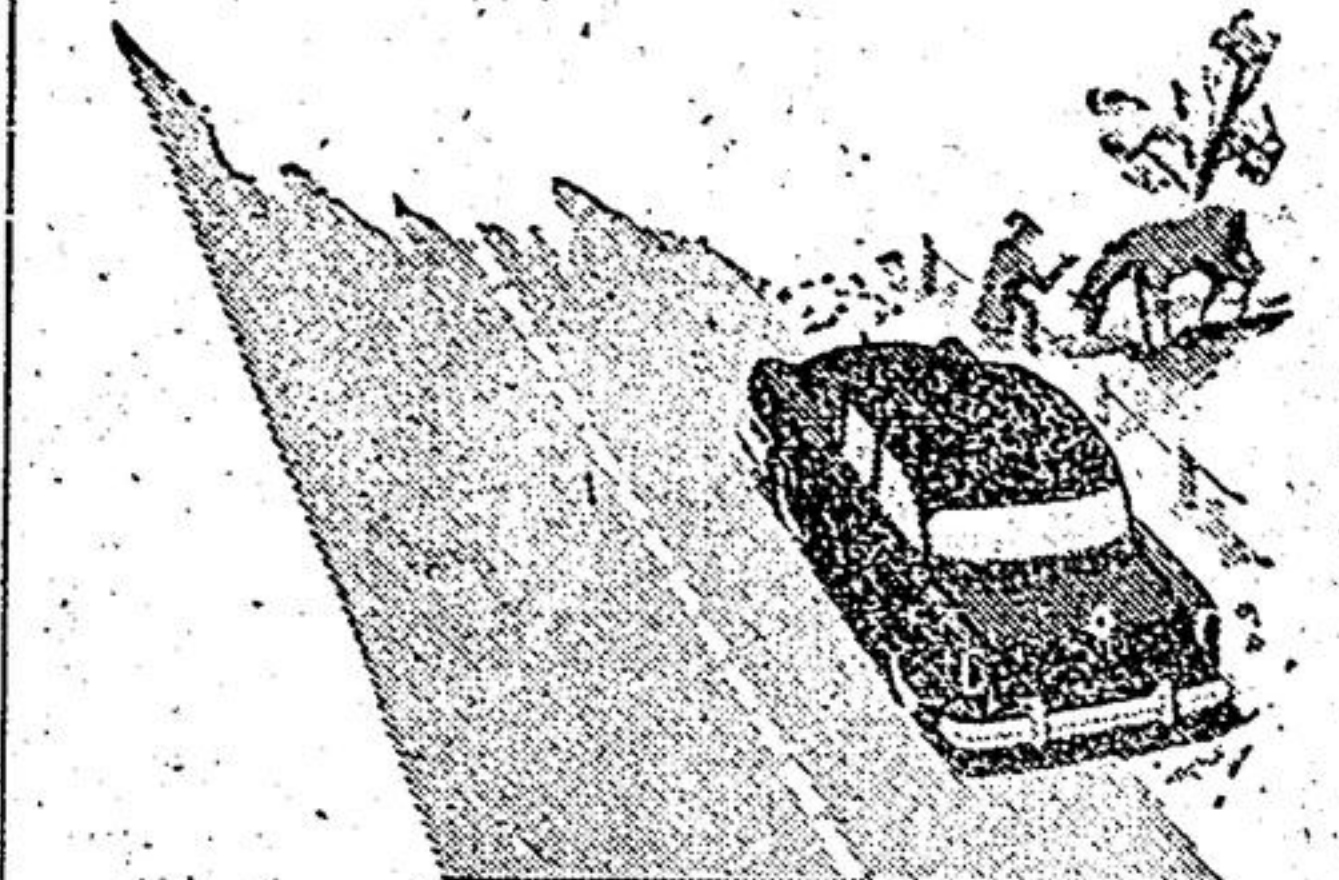
