

Markham Twp. Council Forces School Board To Go To The Ratepayers

By a decisive majority Markham Township Council Monday turned down an application by School Area No. 1 Markham and Vaughan for \$115,000 debenture issue to cover the cost of the proposed new six-room Ross Doan School to be located on Mill Road in Vaughan Township.

On a recorded vote Reeve A. LeMasurier, Deputy-Reeve W. Clark and Councillor A. Little voted against the resolution, while Councillor V. Griffin cast the only vote in favour of the application. Councillor D. Deacon was absent from the meeting.

The majority decision was based on a definite feeling that the cost of the school was too high in relation to the amount of tax money available. Councillor Griffin recommended that as the Trustees had already committed themselves to an architect and contractor, council should approve the application with the warning that they will not approve any further expenditures "until the whole situation is tidied up." The Board will now have the alternative of prices or requesting that the matter be referred to a vote of the people.

Estimates Too High
Reeve LeMasurier maintained that the estimates were out of line with building costs elsewhere in the province. A new 11-room public school is being erected in Markham Village at a cost of \$12,000 per classroom. The new Doan School will cost approximately \$20,000 per classroom. "The school board is erecting a building beyond the assessment of the area concerned. The people living in Highland Park, Thornhill and Langstaff are the ones who are going to have to bear these excess costs," stated Reeve LeMasurier.

Named in Honor of Board Treasurer
Dr. Ross Doan, it was originally planned as a four-room school, and was later increased to a six-room size.

Sluggers Oust Markham From Playoff Competition

For the first time in many years, Markham Aces failed to get into the township playoffs. They were eliminated from further competition on Tuesday night as Buttonville squeezed out a thrilling 5-4 victory. The league-leaders will now meet Thornhill and Newmarket in a round robin elimination series with the top two teams playing off for the championship.

Bud Watson, Buttonville's speedy centrefielder, was the star in Tuesday night's contest. He broke up the game with a circuit clout in the sixth inning with two on base and in the ninth inning on a spectacular fielding play, Moe Petch was cut off at third after smashing a tremendous 300 foot clout with one mate aboard.

The Sluggers jumped into the lead in the third inning with a pair of runs. Geo. Rummy was safe on an error to third sacker Jim Raymer and brother Jack was given a life when first baseman Monte Holman failed to hold Raymer's high throw. A single by Polly Minton and another single base blow by Bert Baker pushed two runs home.

Markham broke into the scoring in the sixth inning. Bill Fowler worked pitcher Jack Rummy for a walk and Lloyd Ramer doubled into left field to score the front-runner. The Sluggers came back in their half of the sixth, however, to notch three runs and lead 5-1. Polly Minton placed a single into short right field and Bert Baker was given a base on balls. With two out, Bud Watson tied off on pitcher Peg O'Neill and was across the plate before the ball was retrieved from the outfield. "Red" Fleming took over on the mound from O'Neill and finished the game.

Markham staged a spectacular last-ditch rally in the seventh and ninth innings and came very close to pulling the game out of the fire. In the seventh, Monte Holman led off with a single and Fleming sacrificed him to second, Morley Petch bounced out pitcher to first but Morris Procenko, blasted a home-run ball into left field, scoring Holman, Markham's chances brightened when Fowler and Atkinson drew walks, but Lloyd Ramer hit into a fielder's choice to retire the side.
