

Approved By Dept.

The Deputy Minister of Health for Ontario has signed the plans car was attempting to pass an for the proposed sewerage system in Stouffville. The plans approved include the addition of a sand filter bed as prescribed by new Ontario legislation adopted this year. The plans for the Stouffville system are the first to be presented and requiring this addition. The plans are now in the hands of the contractor, Swenger Construction Co., whose tender was recently accepted. They will add the additional costs for the filter bed, estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$25,000.

Once this figure is added, which is expected to be this week, Stouffville Council is ready to approach the final hurdle in proceeding with the project, that of gaining approval from the Ont. Municipal Board for the expenditure which will be close to a half million doll-


