Community League Team Records

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Report from Parliament

In recent days, I have been receiving cards, presumably from the employees of General Motors and other automobile subsidiary plants. These cards are to the effect that there has been an increasing number of United States-made motor vehicles and parts imported into Canada. This trend has become a threat to the livelihood of workers in Canada's automotive and parts industries.

It is noted that not many years ago, because of British Commonwealth trade preferences, Canada exported a substantial part of its auto production. Today the trend is the opposite. It shows that 27,392 passenger cars, valued at somewhere in the neighbourhood of \$59 million, were imported from the United States in 1955, compared to 3,154 imported cars in 1950. A great many of these cars were formerly made by Canadian workers from Canadian parts. On July 12th I queried Rt. Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Trade and Commerce, and inquired as to what action the Government was taking on this matter. His reply was that the Government was looking into the whole situation. It will be interesting to note the decision the Government will arrive at when they have investigated the matter thoroughly. Although the output was accelerated at the beginning of this year, the figures for the first half of this year show that motor vehicle output was 277,821 as compared with 281,007 last year.

This is a slight decrease from last year, and the months in which the decreases occurred were June, March and February. Shipments of Canadian-made vehicles to the end of May were about 3,500 less this year than last, but of vehicles imported from the United States were over 22,000 larger. These are figures released by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics under date of Friday, July 13, 1956.

In the same release it is noted that industrial weekly wages and salaries rose to an all-time peak of \$63.84 at May 1st, and industrial employment, as measured by the Bureau's index, was at a record high level for the time of year — hourly earnings of factory wage-earners at May 1st averaged 151.1c and, with a somewhat longer average work week than a month earlier, their weekly earnings averaged high-

er than \$22.54.

The House of Commons is slowly wading its way through the estimates of various Departments and, in between, have tackled a number of Government bills and resolutions. Amongst the most important of these has been a resolution, in the name of the Minister of Finance, for a bill having to do with federal-provincial fiscal agreements. The debate on the resolution lasted for two days and will continue when the bill itself is presented for second reading. The three opposition parties attacked the agreements with a great deal of vigour, claiming that the monetary contribution by the federal Government was niggardly and did not go far enough to help the provinces and, through them, the municipalities in their financial problems regarding education and services with which they are being faced at the present time.

There is no question that the municipalities in particular are in desperate straits, as far as finding sources of revenue to maintain their educational standards in their communities, as well as to provide services for the expanding development and population. From the attitude of the Government it is quite apparent that they are unwilling to relinquish any of their taxing fields and are unresponsive to the agreements presented by the provinces and the opposition members in the House of Commons.

Another important matter which has been discussed, and still is under consideration, is the estimates of the Department of National Defence. The British Government are planning to save some \$150 million in defence expenditures and it is felt by a great many people that Canada should be following that excellent example. The significant trend in Britain is that they are prepared to save \$50 million by reducing the large number of civilians engaged in administrative work in the Defence Department. In Canada the ratio in this respect is one civil servant for every two service men. This, in the eyes of reasonable-thinking people, is ridiculous and the whole matter should be thoroughly investigated. Another puzzling aspect of the National Defence expenditure is that the estimate this year is exactly the same as it was last year — a total of \$1 billion.

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Pickering May Leave Business of Operating Own Gravel Crusher

Reeve Wm. Newman advised Pickering Township Council on Monday evening that he had learned from the township Engineer that the cost to the township of operating their own crusher brought costs higher than if the crushing was done by outside commercial plants.

Mr. Newman said our gravel, produced in our own crusher, averages 52c to 56c cost while commercial plants will do the job for 45c to 50c.

The matter arose from a discussion over the necessity of purchasing one or two new trucks. The reeve stated that the budget would not stand the purchase but suggested that it might be wise to dispose of the small township crusher and seek permission from the highways department to transfer the funds to the purchase of a truck. The matter was left for the return of the Engineer from his holidays.

Grant to Pool

After some discussion over community sponsored parks and swimming pools, a resolution received unanimous approval giving \$200 to the East Woodlands Community Association to help defray the expense of a well to supply a community-owned swimming pool. "Any thing that we can do, we should, to encourage these community projects," declared reeve Newman.

Hardship or No?

Council discussed at some length the advisability of continuing to collect a \$300 deposit with each building permit to assure the municipality that the owner does not live in a cellar or occupy his dwelling before completion.

Mrs. McPherson, councillor, suggested that the \$300 was a hardship to young people trying to build homes.

"It's not as much hardship as an occupancy permit would be," said Reeve Newman.

"Aren't we getting past the stage of development where a deposit is needed?" asked deputy reeve Lawson.

"Everything we do, could be said to create a hardship, but we believe as a council that these things are necessary," said councillor Scott.

No definite action was taken to change the present deposit system.

License Driving Teachers

A bylaw to license persons teaching motor vehicle drivers and regulating equipment used was given three readings and passed. License fee for non-residents is \$50 and for residents \$10. The bylaw carries a penalty of \$300.
