### Markham Names New Road Superintendent

At the regular meeting of the Markham Township Council on Monday evening, it was announced that Mr. Trainer Canning has been appointed the Acting Road Superintendent, subject to approval by the Dept. of Highways. He is replacing the former Road Supt. and engineer, R. Simmons, who recently resigned.

In a letter presented before the council, from the Unionville swimming pool committee, it was stated that 400 children are members receiving lessons in swimming, Red Cross, and life-saving. There will be in excess of \$1,000 in expenses and those in charge were requesting a township grant. The Council agreed to a donation of \$50.

During Monday's meeting, a bylaw was passed restricting the use of fireworks except on designated days such as May 24th each year.

A bill for over a hundred dollars was sent to the Markham Township Council from the Department of Highways for damage done to a Bailey Bridge during an accident last November, on Steeles Ave. Council will investigate the account.

It was proposed by J. D. Lucas, Markham Township Solicitor, that a new rule be brought in under the heading of "Yield Highway". Such a rule would not require a motorist to come to a complete stop when coming to a Thru Highway but would require him to slow down to

### New Ontario County Bridge Will Be Named for Reeve

With traffic throughout the county becoming heavier each year, Ontario County Council are this year carrying out an extensive program, repairing and improving county roads.

County Engineer Ted Sims said that a total of 125 men are working on the 250 miles of road under the jurisdiction of Ontario County.

A large proportion of the money spent on the roads this year will be put out on bridges. Several bridges throughout the county are being improved or replaced, in cases where the bridge was built for much lighter traffic than travels the roads today.

One of the most important projects at present under way, is that of bridging the Severn River, where it is crossed by Rama road.

The original bridge was removed from this heavily travelled portion of road, near Orillia, over a year ago. Since that time traffic has been carried over the river by a temporary Bailey bridge.

This year work has started on a new bridge. The bridge, when completed, will be named the Hart bridge, after Reeve Wilfred Hart of Rama Township.

The buttresses, which will support the bridge, are already in place. The bridge will be a single span, resting on two buttresses. The main part of the bridge will be made of steel.

Mr. Sims said that it is expected that the new bridge will be completed by fall. The estimated cost of erecting the bridge is \$65,000.

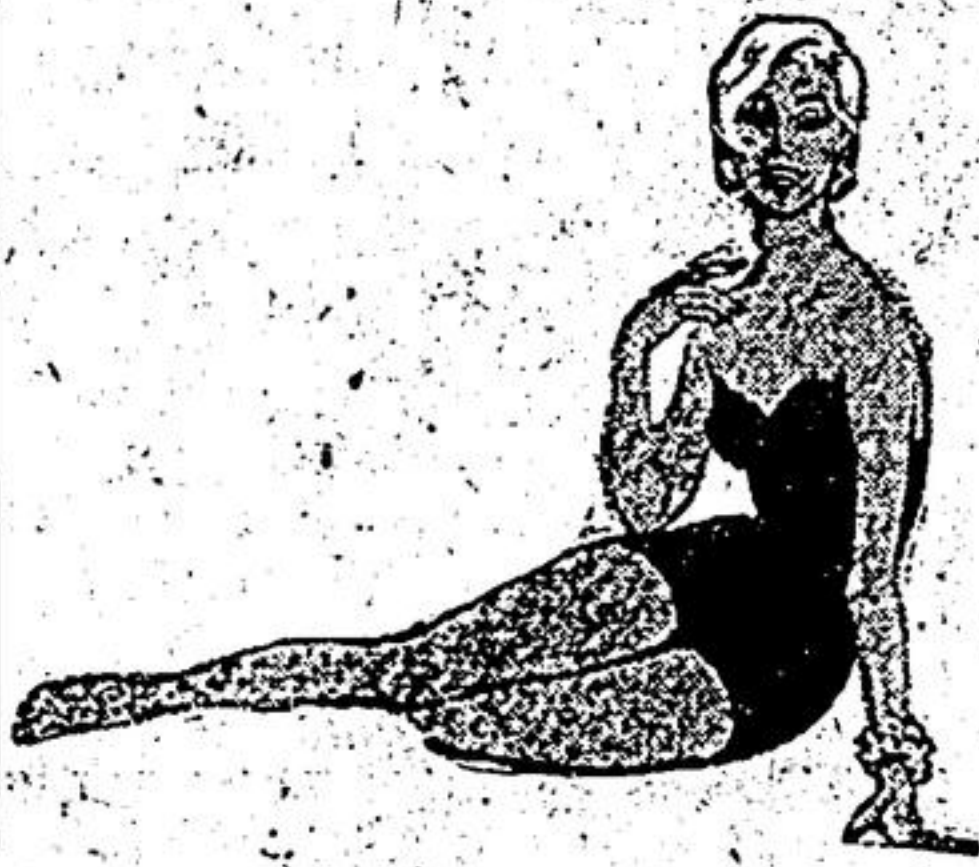

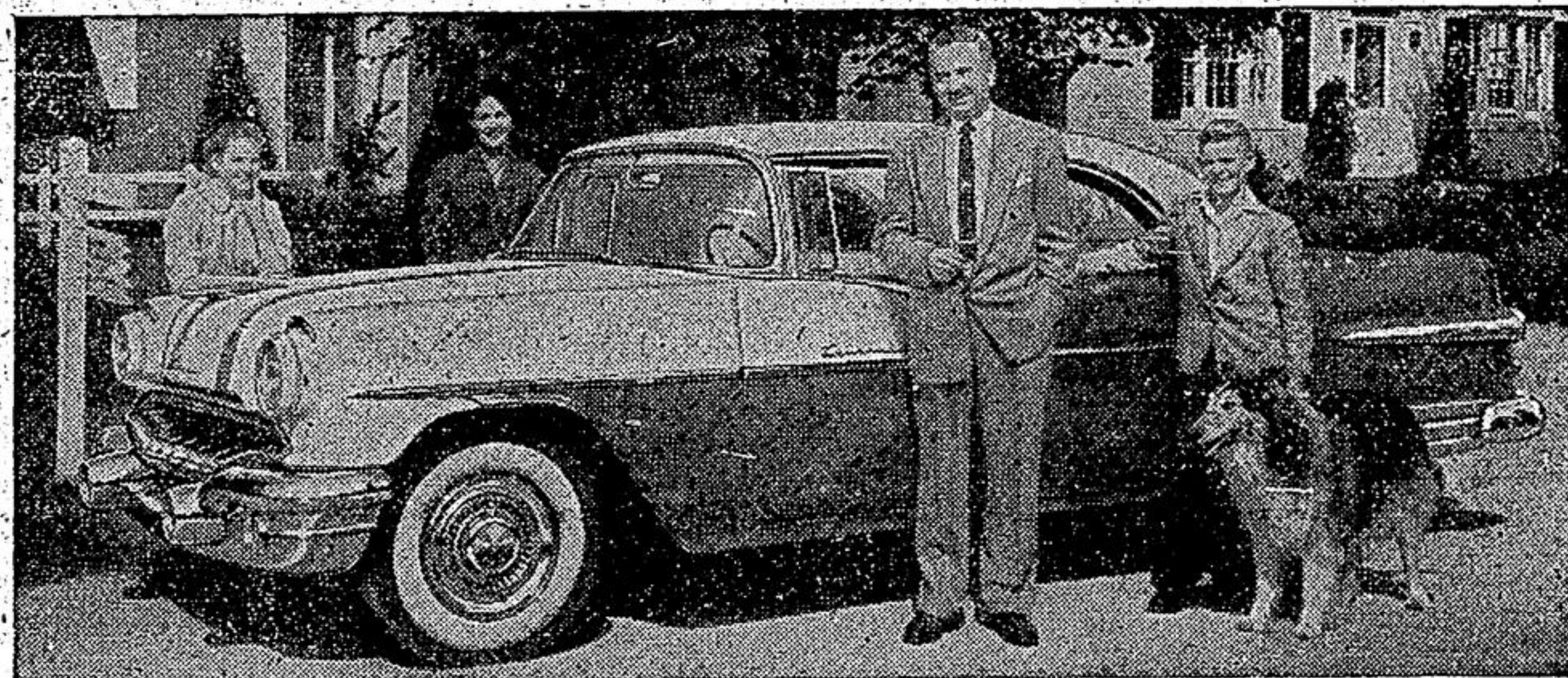
