Geese Re-union
 The Fraser Gee farm home was the scene of a happy family gathering on Saturday, July 14, 1956. Fraser, Winifred and Evelyn Gee were hosts to about one hundred and twenty-five cousins.

The lady of the day was Mrs. Margaret McCague, the one remaining member of the Gee family. Her descendants were loyally represented by children, grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

After days of damp and rain, nature favoured the party with brilliant sunshine. According to age and inclination, the Gees were able to enjoy conversation on the lawn, swimming in the pool, horseshoes in the yard or baseball in the meadow.

A feature of interest was the display of two family trees, the Gee and the Thompson. Joseph Gee who was born in Wiltshire in 1832, emigrated to this country as a young man and farmed in the Oak Ridges area before purchasing, on the 14th of July 1877, the homestead farm near Victoria Square. In 1863 he married Margaret Thompson, nee Fraser, of Burton, Ont. She was the mother of eight children—Elizabeth Gee-Julian, George Gee, Sara Jane Gee-Collard, Robert Callender Gee, Mary Ann Gee-Smith, Joseph Gee, Margaret Agnes Gee-McCague, and Jessie Fraser Gee.

The descendants of Joseph Gee were much in the majority at Saturday's party. Several cousins spoke, recalling happenings in the old days.
