National 4-H Club Week, Nov. 10-15

The 25th National 4-H Club Week to be held in Toronto, November 10-15 is to have something of a new look. In line with Canada's rapid economic development, the scope of 4-H training is being broadened. The objective is to give boys and girls a comprehensive insight into our national problems and the part the country plays in international affairs.

In accordance with this broader outlook, this year's program in Toronto will not include National 4-T judging contests. These contests have over the years, made a substantial contribution to club work, but now the emphasis is being directed more to the overall training of the boys and girls. Elimination of the national contests will also mean that the delegates to Toronto will be much more representative of 4-H activities generally. For example, 4-H members enrolled in tractor maintenance, sheep and forestry projects, which were not among national judging contests, will be attending for the first time.

At this year's Club Week delegates will be addressed by agricultural authorities and also by experts engaged in national and international activities. Ample opportunity will be given for the young people to discuss subjects affecting Canadians as citizens and Canada's role in world affairs.

But it will not be all work and no play. A professional hockey game is on the agenda. Visits will be made to Niagara Falls, the Royal Winter Fair and to places of interest in and around Toronto. Delegates will spend the last day in Ottawa, where they will be received by the Governor General, attend a luncheon given by the Canada Department of Agriculture and four Parliament Buildings. Hints for Showing Your Fall Fair Vegetables

Farmers and home gardeners will soon be selecting and preparing their vegetables and roots for the fall fair. The first display in this district is the Horticultural Show on Wednesday, Aug. 22nd.

In selecting vegetables, it is wise to remember that a vegetable judge considers very important such things as quality, general eye appeal, the condition of the entry, true-ness of type, uniformity and color.

Over-size vegetables should not be selected. They are often rough and coarse. On the other hand, undersized produce is often tough and low in quality.

Each specimen should be fresh, smooth and free from disease, insect damage or growth cracks. The uniformity of the exhibit merits some attention by the judges. This is a point upon which many exhibitors fall down. Although color receives only a minor share of judging points, unless it is bright and clear and attractive, it can pull down the score. In general, darker colors are preferred to those which are light. Color in vegetables is a matter of condition and is a reliable index of the attention the vegetable has received.
