### Motor Accident Cases Heard At Pickering

Mrs. Violet Brush, 42, of Old Forest road, Pickering, pleaded guilty to a charge of careless driving and was fined \$10 and costs in Pickering Police Court.

Constable Frank Robson told the court that he investigated the accident on Rosebank road where he found the Brush car in the ditch. He said Mrs. Brush had a temporary licence.

Mrs. Brush said she drove into the ditch to avoid striking a woman and two children.

Robert Gates, age 19, was fined \$10 and costs on two charges. One, applying for a licence permit while still a minor, the other, obtaining liquor while a minor.

Gates admitted the offences. Constable Robert Rae said acting on certain information he investigated and found a bottle of gin in Gates' car.

K. V. Hosking of Oshawa was fined \$50 and costs or one month when found guilty of a charge of careless driving on No. 2 Highway, just west of Harwood Avenue, Ajax.

Lawrence Fleury of Ajax told the court that he turned west on No. 2 after stopping at Harwood Avenue. Some distance west his truck was struck from behind by a car driven by Hosking.

After hearing evidence from several witnesses and police evidence Magistrate Mitchell said there was no doubt that Hosking was driving at excessive speed, probably 68 miles an hour, judging by the skid marks. He was fortunate it wasn't a serious accident.

Harold Felschow of Pickering was fined \$25 and costs when found guilty on a charge of careless driving.

Albert Goslin told the court he had stopped on Brock road to allow a truck ahead to make a left hand turn when Felschow's truck plowed into him from the rear.

Felschow told the magistrate he didn't see the car ahead until it was too late.

A charge of careless driving against Cornelius Vanderkraam of Aurora was dismissed without hearing the defence.

John Catton, age 19, of Scarborough said he was westbound on No. 2 Highway at Brock road when the Vanderkraam car came from the south and drove in front of him.

PC Robson in his evidence said Vanderkraam told him at the scene that he didn't stop as he thought he was on No. 2 highway.

Damage to Catton's car was \$350.
