

### Weed Seeds Terrific Travellers

Nature, in her unceasing effort to create new life, has many ways of spreading seeds — weed seeds as well as those of wanted vegetation, says the Field Crops Branch of the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture.

Many seeds, such as those of the common dandelion, are equipped with a tiny parachute that enables them to be carried long distances by the wind. Sow thistle, goat's beard, prickly lettuce and Canada thistle are other examples of plants whose seeds are scattered by the wind. Some plants such as twitch grass, tumbling mustard or tumble weed break off at the root when mature and roll across the countryside at the whim of every wind, releasing their seeds as they go. Then there is the maple key which is equipped with two aeroplane wings on which it travels long distances on a windy day.

Many plants use water as a means of travel and the seeds of such weeds as the docks, chick-

### Expect 40 Deaths Labor Day Weekend

Labour Day weekend — last big holiday of the season — will make a grim finale to summer fun for many Canadians unless better accident precautions are taken, warns the All Canada Insurance Federation.

Officials of the Federation, which represents more than 200 fire, automobile and casualty insurance companies, said accidents of all types will result in an estimated 40 deaths. Traffic fatalities will account for more than half of these; a considerable number will be drownings.

Planning well-ahead for weekend driving and extra care on the roads will help avoid highway accidents, said insurance officials, while simple water precautions can prevent drowning tragedies.

For a carefree weekend, safety experts recommend these rules:

1. If driving after a full day's work, plan to cover shorter distances than you would when fresh.
2. Avoid overloading cars to the point where safe, comfortable driving is impaired. Young, active children should be kept in the back seat.
3. Beware of fatigue — stop about every 100 miles to stretch muscles and drink coffee or other alertness beverage. Keep windows open for fresh air.
4. Avoid overeating — drowsiness can result.
5. Split long trips into convenient sections. Change drivers when possible.
6. Be sure that brakes, windshield wipers work properly; check tires.
7. Drive more slowly on unfamiliar roads — never more than 40 miles per-hour at night.

For safe swimming and boating, experts suggest these precautions:

1. Swimming is dangerous if you are tired or overheated, after dark or too soon after eating.
2. Never swim alone or with a non-swimmer.
3. Make a point of learning artificial respiration even if you are a non-swimmer.
4. Motor-boats of all sizes should be equipped with approved life-jackets and fire extinguishers.
5. Boat owners should not take non-swimmers in their craft; teach children to swim before making them "crew" members.
6. Avoid fishing in canoes — it can be dangerous.
