CHIROPRACTIC FOR BACKACHE

Greenwood Man Will Sell Year of Life for \$10,000

Derek Edwards, 30, of Greenwood, says he is prepared to sell his 31st year to provide security, a bright future and freedom for his wife and three young children.

For the year — during which he says he is prepared to do anything, go anywhere, even at the risk of his life — he wants \$10,000. British-born Derek, who arrived in Canada five years ago, defined freedom as freedom from want, near-poverty and worry.

In the living room of his four-room home at Greenwood he said: "I am willing to do anything and go anywhere at any time, even if it means my life is in danger — provided its legal and provided it's worth \$10,000 to someone."

It otherwise would take years of struggling to make ends meet. Rather than have his wife, Mary, 26, and his children, Richard, 3, and Susan, 3, and Graham, 2, face lean years he was prepared to do something about it.

Derek, with no skilled trade, has been without work for a month. A former salesman and a native of Liverpool, he has tried insurance selling, without success.

"The best job I've been offered pays \$48 a week and I can't keep a family on that. I can't even afford to move to a location where there are more opportunities," he said.

Jack Smith, M.P. Will Not Seek A Fourth Term

Jack Smith, M.P. for North York since 1945, this week told a Meeting of the Executive of the North York Liberal Association that for reasons of health, he would be unable to be a candidate at the next election.

President Lorne C. Lee of Aurora and all Members of the Executive, expressed regret at the announcement, and tendered to Mr. Smith thanks and appreciation for his many years of public service and his successful leadership of the Party. It was announced that a Convention of the North York Liberal Association will be held this fall to name a candidate to contest the next election expected in 1957 or 1958.

Jack Smith, M.P. was first elected to the House of Commons as representative of North York in 1945 and was re-elected with substantial majorities in 1949 and 1953. Previous to his election to Parliament, Mr. Smith served for many years as President and Secretary of the North York Liberal Association. For more than thirty years he has been active in the political life of the constituency.

He suffered a heart attack in April 1955 and while his recovery has been sufficient to resume his business and political duties, his doctors advise against his being a candidate in another election.
