The Ontario County Juniors brought honour home for the county when they competed successfully in the Junior Farmers Judging Competition at the C.N.E. The county was represented by ten Junior Farmers and 4-H members and in spite of the fine day for harvesting, some 275 contestants from the province participated.

Competition in all classes was keen. Lloyd Wilson, Uxbridge R.R. 2, again showed his judging knowledge by not only winning the 4-H Section in Grains and Roots, but also placing 4th in the Dairy Class. Murray Jackson, Brooklin R.R. 1, placed second in the Grains and Roots, and 12th in the Beef Class. Other winners in the 4-H Section were Louise Lishman, Pickering R.R. 1, who placed 15th in Dairy; Keith Davidson, Uxbridge R.R. 1, who was 6th and Keith Shier, Cannington R.R. 1, 14th in Beef.

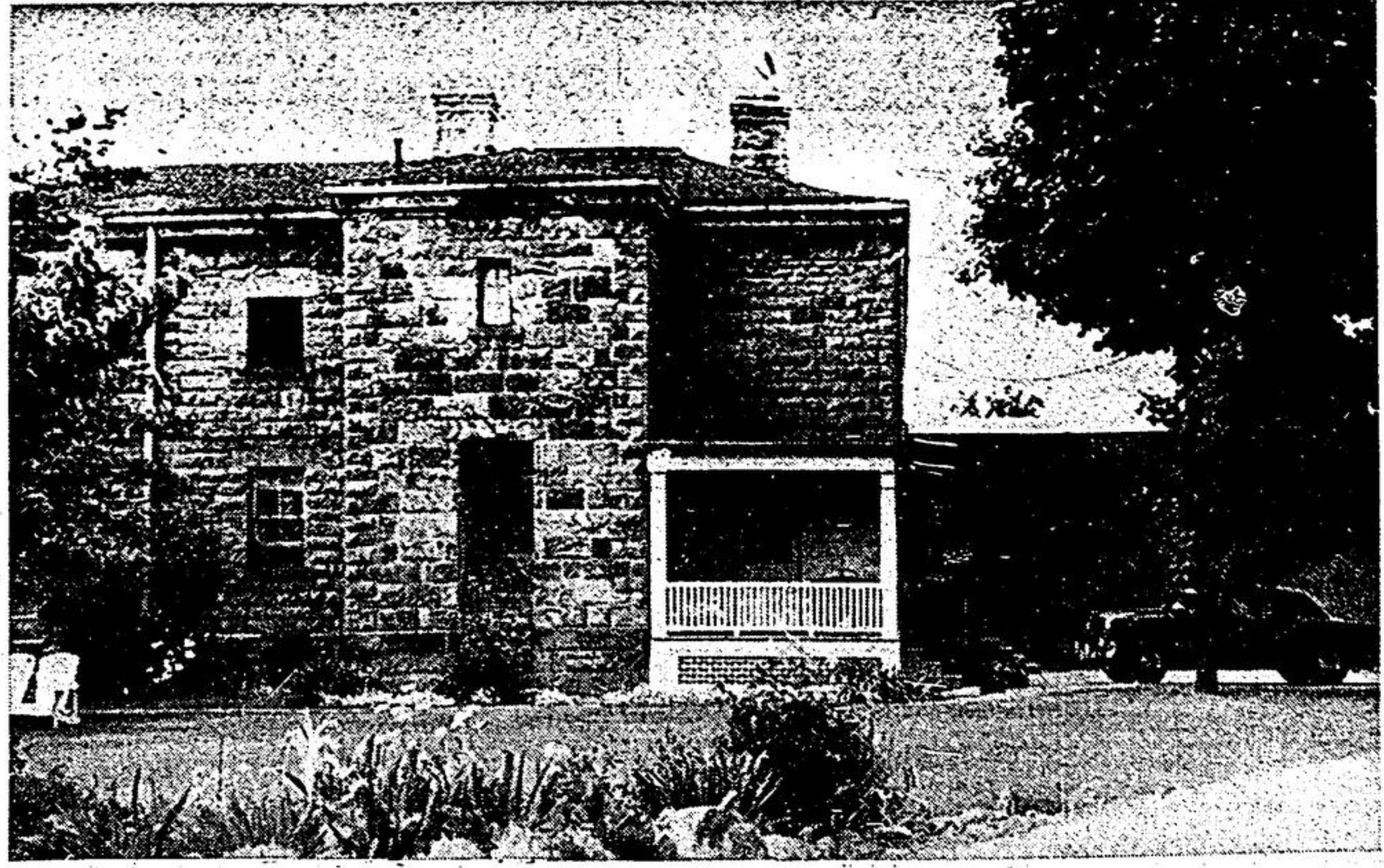

Old County Jail Soon To Be Emptied



Soon to be replaced by an ultra-modern structure on Bryn St. S., in Port Whitby, Ont., County's jail on King Street last year celebrated its 100th birthday. The building, almost

surrounded by a high brick wall, was built to accommodate 29 prisoners. It will be replaced by a new building with a total capacity, including death cells, of 71 persons.

The old jail, above, has often been condemned by grand juries, following their periodic inspections, as being overcrowded. The ultimate fate of the old jail, above, was not announced. It occupies about one quarter of a county-owned block on which are also located the county courthouse and the registry office.

F. A. Lashley, Secretary-Manager of the Ontario Plowmen's Association, announced today that Hon. W. A. Goodfellow, the newly appointed Minister of Agriculture, would open the International Plowing Match at Brooklin, October 9.

At the same time Mr. Lashley said that to make certain that uniform standards will be used in judging the work of contestants, the judges who will officiate during the week of October 9 to 12 will attend a "refresher course" in judging on September 10. The judges will have an opportunity of getting their eye in and exchanging notes when they meet on the farm of C. Ricci, Esquimes Township, Halton County. Various types of plowing will be demonstrated.

With advance registrations particularly heavy, Mr. Lashley warned that the deadline for applications for exhibit or concession space is September 1. Final day for making entries in the various plowing classes is September 28.

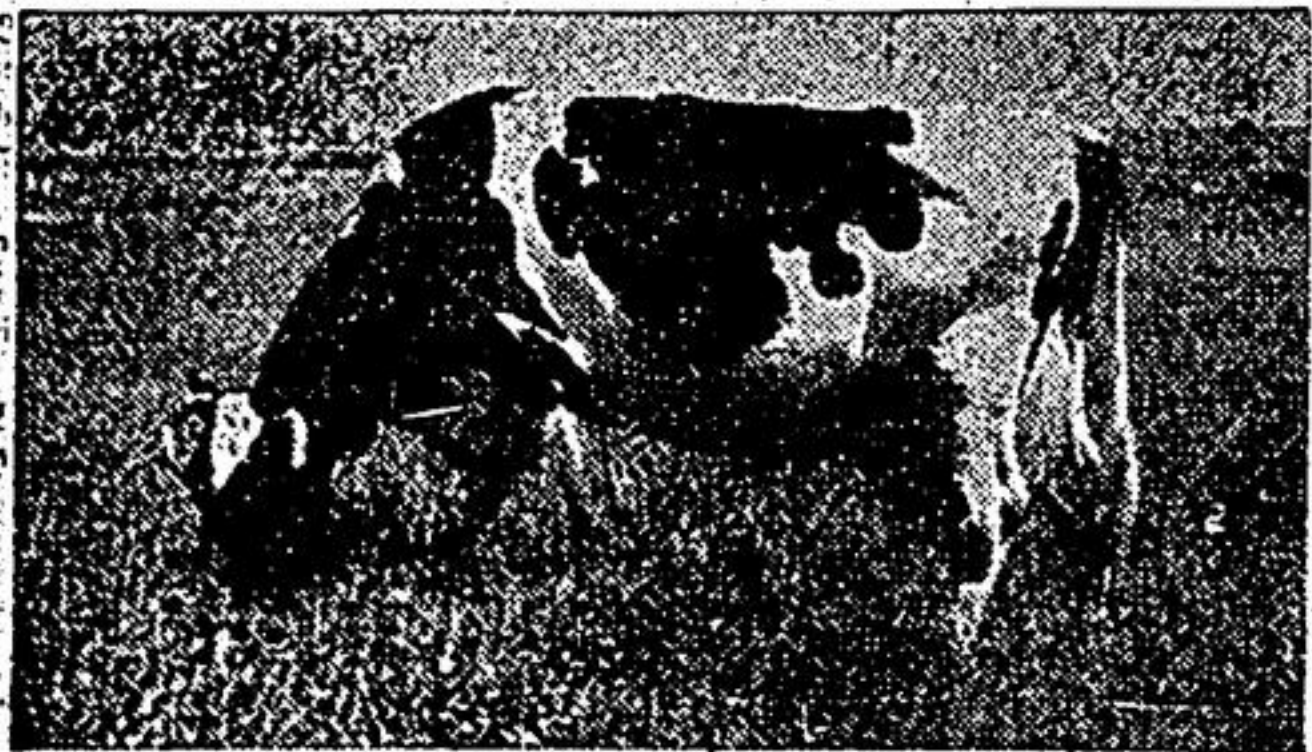

MANURE ALONE Is NOT Enough

FOR PRODUCTIVE HAY AND PASTURE

Mixed hay and pasture yielding 2 tons dry matter per acre requires approximately 90 lbs. nitrogen, 45 lbs. phosphorous and 90 lbs. potassium.

With an application of 8 tons manure per acre, approximately 24 lbs. nitrogen, 8 lbs. phosphorous and 32 lbs. potassium is all that will be made available the first year. Legumes can supply some of the nitrogen lacking, but phosphorous and potassium will have to be supplied supplementally.

For example, where grasses dominate on heavy land which is manured once every three years, there should be a fall application of 4-12-10 at 300 to 600 lbs. per acre every 3 years.
