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## YOUR HEALTH

### PREVENTING ARTHRITIS

Today there is a great deal of talk about arthritis and discoveries like ACTH and Cortisone, which apparently provide temporary relief. There will be a lot more talk and many dollars will be spent for cures, but how much on prevention?

Research into the subject of posture and body balance has shown that over 70% of adults have conditions of poor posture. Again — in an article written by Dr. J. G. Kuhns, he states, "Chronic arthritis occurs less frequently in a joint where normal function is not disturbed. Normal function in a joint is dependent mechanically upon proper anatomical alignment of the bones . . . In faulty body mechanics, often all these may be wrong. This is seen particularly well in the spine and lower extremities. When the body is badly poised, weight is often

not well-balanced over supporting structures. Muscular pull and tension are altered from the changed alignment of the body. Slight disparity of the particular surfaces of joints frequently results."
