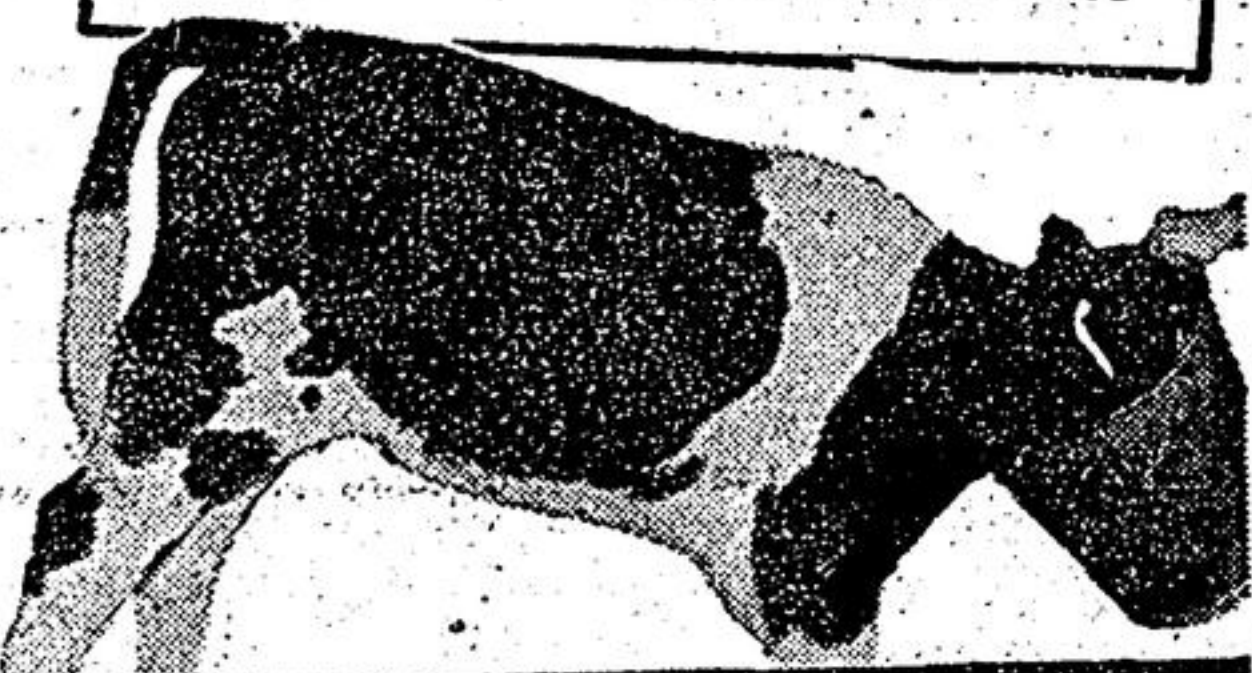

## First of Concert Series Here on October 22
