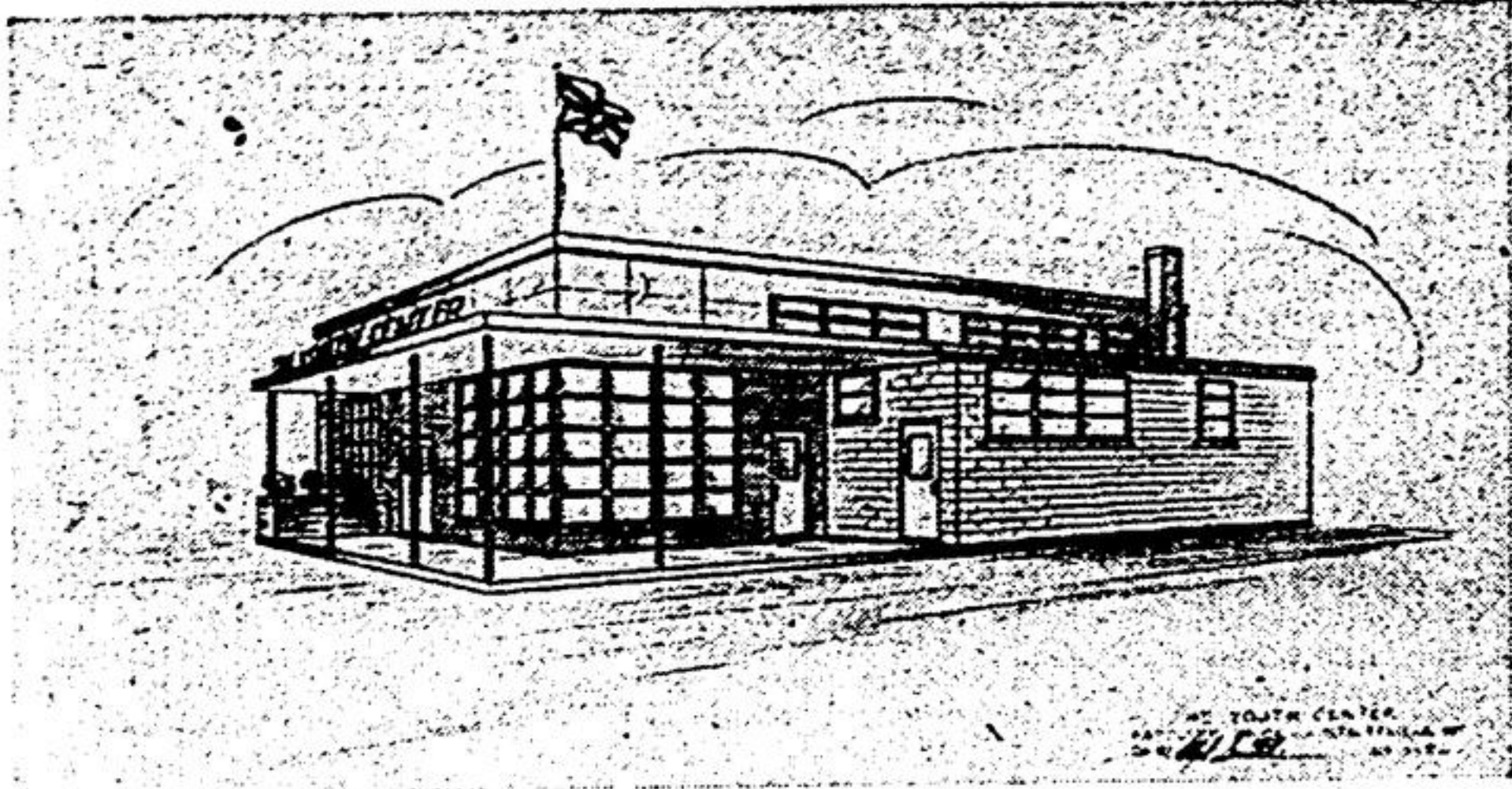


## 6th Line White Centre New Youth Centre On Town Line

Harvey Jackson, Stouffville RR 4, driving his car in the westend limits Saturday night collided with the rear of another car operated by Steve Thompson of Stouffville. The Jackson car sustained considerable damage. On Monday morning this week a car driven by Douglas Graham of Stouffville RR 4, travelling east, collided with a truck driven by C. Cardiff as the latter was making a left-hand turn near the Mayfair restaurant.
