we want to save farmers' lives."
Mr. Sykes said many agencies
had tried to combat farm acci-
dents by producing books and
pamphlets on how to drive trac-
tors safely. "Unfortunately the
farmer is so busy heading for his
own particular accident that he
doesn't take the time to read
those helpful booklets," said Mr.
Sykes. "We feel, however, that
he will understand the recom-
mendations we have made. We
think any intelligent farmer will
see that they have been suggest-
ed for his own good."
To impress upon farmers the
importance of farm safety —
especially where tractors are in-
volved — Mr. Sykes said the
ORFEDA show, which will run
at the CNE Coliseum, Jan. 30 to
Feb. 2, will be devoted to "farm
safety first."
Over 300 exhibitors will be at
this year's show, Mr. Sykes said,
and all will be stressing farm
safety. "We also plan to have
expert drivers show farmers the
right and wrong way to handle
tractors," he added. "One pic-
ture is worth a thousand words,
true, but when you see some-
thing with your own eyes you
just don't forget it and we feel
that these safe driving exhibi-
tions will definitely help to cut
down on farm accidents."

M.D. 80, WINS HALF OF ACCIDENT SUIT

Dr. Arthur L. Hore, 80, of
Markham, was awarded \$100
and costs in an action arising
out of a traffic accident in Sep-
tember, 1955.
The defendant, Arthur J. Cam-
eron, of Hamilton, was success-
ful in his counter-claim and was
awarded \$62.50 damages.
The jury found the plaintiff
and defendant each 50 percent
to blame for the accident in Un-
ionville on Highway No. 7. It

the plaintiff failed to take the
necessary precautions to make
sure he had sufficient time to
