Oshawa — Canada's Finest Regional Shopping Centre

The new Oshawa Shopping Centre advertised in this week's Tribune is expected to have more than 100,000 customers, some of them coming from as far as Peterborough, Lindsay, Cobourg and Scarborough. This highlights the fact that the shopping centre belongs not just to Oshawa but to the region as a whole; its trade area target aimed not only at the city but at customers in villages and towns 20 to 30 miles from the centre and from even further afield.

The centre has been planned with an eye to the future. It has been planned to grow, to meet the future needs of a fast expanding trade area. Its present retail tenant area, which is about 450,000 square feet, is flexible enough to allow room for expansion in the future.

The trade area of the centre can be divided into two zones: the primary and secondary.

The present population of the primary zone is 83,000 people. By 1961 it is expected to grow to 94,000. It is expected that almost all residents in this area will visit the centre regularly and do most of their shopping here.

The outer, secondary, zone is approximately 10 to 30 miles from the centre. The customers

PRIN. INVESTMENTS PLAN MORE CENTRES

By the end of 1958 the value of Principal Investments' ownership in shopping centres is expected to be more than one million dollars. Since their first centre opened in 1952, they have built fourteen further centres, the latest being the new Oshawa Shopping Centre advertised this week in The Tribune. And there are many more P.I. shopping plazas to come.

In Toronto, seven centres are already operating, and 9 more will soon be in service. They are: Richview Plaza, Richview Side Road at Highway 27; Thisdowntown Plaza, Albion Rd. at Islington Avenue; Dufferin Park Plaza, Dufferin Street south of Bloor; Vaughan Plaza, Yonge St. at Steeles Ave.; Greenwood Plaza, Danforth Avenue at Coxwell Ave.; Northcrest Plaza, Woodbine Avenue at Sheppard Ave.; Cedarbrae Plaza, Lawrence Avenue East at Markham Road, and Lansing Plaza, Kingston Road at Lansing Cut-off.

Elsewhere in Ontario, Principal Investment plazas are planned for Barrie, Brantford, Kingston, London, North Bay, St. Catharines, Sarnia, Sudbury and Windsor. Others will be built at Calgary, Regina, St. John and Victoria, B.C.
