

# Christmas Light-ups

1. Mix 2½ c. rolled oats, 1½ c. sifted all-purpose flour, ¾ c. brown sugar, 1 tsp. soda and ¼ tsp. salt. Cut in ¼ c. butter with pastry blender or knives. Mix mixture is crumbly.

2. Press half this mixture in the bottom of a well-buttered 8" x 8" cake tin, soaked with 2 c. whole cranberry sauce and sprinkle with 1 tsp. grated orange rind and ½ c. shredded coconut.

3. Top with remaining oatmeal mixture. Bake 35°F. for 40-45 min. Cut into squares, serve warm or cold. Make "candies" by topping with ice cream rolls; use almonds for "flames".
