The proposed tax, under study by the committee for several months, is based on the weight of the vehicle loaded and the distance travelled.

Turn Down Markham Request for Education Investigating Committee

A request that a consultative committee be named to investigate the possibility of Vaughan and Markham townships forming separate Boards of Education was refused by York County council last week.

The request was made by Reeve Alf LeMasurier and Deputy Reeve W. L. Clark of Markham township.

Mr. LeMasurier explained that the recommendation for such a committee had come from the Public School Inspector who advised that the consultative committee consist of the Inspector, one person to be appointed by the Minister of Education and three others, to be named by York County council.

"We need the committee to investigate the educational situation in our townships," Mr. LeMasurier said.

"We have the condition where, in my opinion, the costs in one public school area are completely out of line."

Deputy Reeve A. H. Rutherford of Vaughan township told county council that Vaughan council had received a copy of this resolution from Markham.

It was discussed but since we felt that we didn't have enough information we did not make a recommendation, he said.

"I can't support a resolution proposed by one municipality which mentions another, in which it does not concur," said Deputy Reeve Kenneth Tomlin of Richmond Hill.

"If only one municipality is in favor of the consultative committee it should name Markham Township and not Markham and Vaughan. We can't adopt this resolution unless it has the complete support of both municipalities," he added.

"I can't agree with it," Mr. Rutherford replied, "when Vaughan council did not support it. No decision was reached on this resolution," he explained.

"This is not a recommendation made by Markham township," said Mr. LeMasurier. "This suggestion came from the Public School Inspector. Perhaps because of the selfish interest of one municipality, it has not approved it."

"This wasn't a selfish act," replied Mr. Rutherford. "It was just that Vaughan hasn't discussed the matter."

"This is not something the townships should go into at this point," argued Mr. LeMasurier. "It should be a neutral committee that investigates the situation and makes its recommendations. Then it will be up to the municipalities to discuss it. All this resolution calls for is the naming of a consultative committee to get information about the educational situation in Markham and Vaughan town-

Bass to Sweden A project to ship live bass to Europe materializes this week when 400 small-mouthed black bass leave Toronto's Malton airport on a plane trip to Sweden. The fish will go by air via Toronto, New York and Copenhagen and then by tank-truck to Sweden. To keep the fish alive the journey has to be made in 30 hours. This unusual flight grew out of some Scandinavian reel manufacturers. They were taken fishing here and concluded that the small-mouth bass was one of the sportiest fish they had handled. This shipment will be in batches of 50 fish in eight five-gallon polythene containers. Each holds three gallons of water and a large supply of oxygen. The sealed containers are placed in insulated ice-cream sacks.

CARS ARE MY LINE by Neil Patrick HERE'S HOW TO SAVE GAS Someone has estimated the average driver wastes, just throws away uselessly, 34 gallons of gasoline a year, enough to keep a car on the road for a month or six weeks. Studies over a number of years have shown that motorists are averaging 18 miles to the gallon when they should be getting 19. Stupid driving habits, we might as well be blunt about it, are mainly to blame. There are so many "rules for drivers" that one person can't possibly keep them all in his head. But these six rules come from the head of a big fleet of company cars; he found these rules cut their cost-per-mile way down and brought that extra month of free driving. Don't make jackrabbit starts. Get away smoothly and shift into high gear as soon as possible. Slow down gradually when you know you're going to have to stop. Your car runs on the power from gasoline already burned, so there's no sense wasting all that momentum by coming to quick stops. Don't race your motor while waiting for lights to change or while warming up. Moderate speeds save gas and save the brakes. Don't ride the clutch or brakes. And finally, get regular checkups and servicing. So many of the cars we've sold new, and have serviced right along, come back to us to be traded in.
