AGRICULTURAL FEDERATION CONVENTION

The twentieth annual meeting of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture held Nov. 5 to 8 in Toronto completed an unusually heavy agenda. Some two hundred and twenty delegates and directors, plus another two hundred guests and county observers attended the sessions.

Lloyd Jasper, President of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, in opening the meeting predicted that no appreciable rise in net farm income for 1957 is foreseen.

A resolution, among many others, was passed asking the provincial government to increase its financial support of the Dept. of Economics of the Ont. Agricultural College. The meeting felt that research in farm organization, marketing, and in many of the fields in which co-operatives are operating require intensified economic research.

The meeting in resolution asked the Ontario and Federal governments that if any additional marketing legislation or amendments to present legislation is required by a Supreme Court decision, this should be carried out.

The meeting approved of the incorporation of the Ont. Federation of Agriculture. This will provide better representation to Ontario farmers and provide liability protection to the organization's officers.

The annual meeting approved in principle an increased budget for the Ontario Federation of Agriculture.
