OVER 800 LISTINGS IN NEW PHONE BOOK

Mr. Tom Rae, Manager of the local Bethesda and Stouffville Telephone Company, informed The Tribune this week that there are more than 800 new listings and changes in the exchanges of Clarendon, Stouffville and Gormley. This is a sizeable increase in comparison with 1955. A total of 2,500 new telephone books are now in the hands of local subscribers.

In the entire directory, there are a total of 8,500 new and changed listings, including all the two-letter, five-figure numbers coming into effect at Newmarket and Oak Ridges. The dial system introduced in these centres became effective on Sunday.

WHOLESALE SUGAR PRICES CLIMB \$1.70 PER 100 POUNDS

Wholesale price of sugar shot up another 20 cents last week to make the increase in the last ten days \$1.70 for 100 pounds. However, the increase has not yet affected consumers. Retail prices in local stores remained static. Although in several other Ontario centres, sugar buying has been much heavier, retail stores here have noticed no rush.

The situation in the Far East may have caused the increase or it may be speculation, wholesalers believe. One wholesale dealer said the advance in sugar prices could have a drastic reaction on all products containing sugar. Jams, cereals and candy prices have already begun to climb.

Funeral service for Stanley H. Young, 63, former president and chairman of the board of Christie Brown Co. Ltd., was held Friday at 2 p.m. at Humbercrest United Church, Baby Point Rd. Interment was at Butontville cemetery.

Mr. Young died Wednesday at his Baby Point Terrace home. The body is at the Turner and Porter chapel, Roncesvalles Ave. Born at Sunderland, Mr. Young came to Toronto in his teens and enlisted with the Canadian army for overseas service in World War I. His career in the Christie Brown Company began in 1920. He will be recalled by sports fans here when he visited town on numerous occasions with Sunderland Ball Club as a pitcher.

Active in the Canadian Red Cross, he was president-elect of the Ontario branch. He was a member of the Granite club and the Newcomen Society of America. Mr. Young was also on the board of governors of Queensway hospital and was a leader in community and welfare projects.

Surviving are his widow, the former Myrtle Wilson; two sons, John of Penitence, B.C., and Thomas of Toronto; a daughter, Mrs. W. E. Redpath, of Edmonton, a sister, Cora L. Young of Whitby and two grandchildren.
