To Close Ten Roads When Baseline Done

Ten roads, which now cross Highway 401 in Pickering, Whitby Twp., and the town of Whitby, are scheduled to be closed when the baseline, from Whitby to Frenchman's Bay, is rebuilt. This was learned last week by the Ontario County council in a communication from the Dept. of Highways which will spend \$\$00,000 on the development of the baseline as a service road.

Planned to be closed in the town of Whitby are Jeffrey and Blair streets. Planned for closing in Whitby Twp. is the road allowance between lots 32 and 33. The townline, the road dividing Whitby and Pickering townships, will not be closed.

Scheduled for closing in Pickering Twp. are the Valley Farm Road, the Brock Road, Station Road, the Greenwood Road, the Pickering Beach Road, an unnamed road between lots 4 and 5, the Audley Road.

County Engineer R. E. Sims. replying to questions concerning the closing of the Brock Road, stated that it was intended that a service road run along the north side of Highway 401, allowing traffic from the Brock Road to enter the highway at either Picekring or Liverpool cloverleaf. If, in the future, he said, traffic would warrant a cloverleaf at the Brock Road, the county would make application to the department.
