cupled, and so must the hands, and to do this, days and months on end for 20 children, is no mean task.
Mrs. Cook and her staff find games and books are required in almost inexhaustible supply. They have learned from experience to hand out only one at a time to each patient.
At Weston, Mrs. Cook never ceases to be surprised that the children do not ask much less coax to get out of bed. They seem to accept staying in bed as part of their getting better.
Even the babies, after the first day or two, accept the restraint which holds them in bed without complaining. Those of school age are allowed to attend classes from 11 to 12, and again from three to four in the afternoon.
They are settled down for the night by 8 o'clock and the first awakening sounds are likely to be heard shortly after 5 a.m.
All patients at the Davies cottage are on the three new drugs, streptomycin, PAS and isoniazid. These drugs, combined with the long-accepted treatment of good food, rest and pleasant environment, restore them to health in about a year. Some leave even before this time. Children's deaths, from tuberculosis are now almost unheard-of.
More than half these children contracted the disease from parents unknown to have it, many of them one or more parents in the adult section of the sanatorium.
Mrs. Cook has also seen several cases of disease contracted from the family babysitter and strongly urges all mothers to ask the babysitter to go to the Gage clinic, College St., for a free chest x-ray before engaging her.
Mrs. Cook says there was a time when she felt sorry for children in sanatoria at Christ mas, but no longer. "I believe they have a far better time than they would at home. They have parties and presents and all the good food they can tolerate."

JUNE AND JULY BAD MONTHS FOR FOREST FIRES

More than half of the 595 forest fires which have occurred in Ontario this year up to Oct. 18th were in June and early July and, as was the case last year, lightning led all other fire causes, the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests reports. Most of the 196,233 acreage burned was fire swept in the same two months. The 1956 fire, 2,236 of them, burned 374,421 acres.
The forest fire season ends officially on October 31 but can be extended by the Minister, Hon. Clare E. Macleod, if the fire hazard warrants. Warm weather, scarcity of rain and drying leaves and herbaceous growth are all fire dangers. The season calls for care by hunters and others in wooded areas.

They are settled down for the night by 8 o'clock and the first awakening sounds are likely to be heard shortly after 5 a.m.
All patients at the Davies cottage are on the three new drugs, streptomycin, PAS and isoniazid. These drugs, combined with the long-accepted treatment of good food, rest and pleasant environment, restore them to health in about a year. Some leave even before this time. Children's deaths, from tuberculosis are now almost unheard-of.
More than half these children contracted the disease from parents unknown to have it, many of them one or more parents in the adult section of the sanatorium.
Mrs. Cook has also seen several cases of disease contracted from the family babysitter and strongly urges all mothers to ask the babysitter to go to the Gage clinic, College St., for a free chest x-ray before engaging her.
Mrs. Cook says there was a time when she felt sorry for children in sanatoria at Christ mas, but no longer. "I believe they have a far better time than they would at home. They have parties and presents and all the good food they can tolerate."
