Cedar Grove Organizes For Hungarian Relief

The first Hungarians are beginning to arrive in Canada, having escaped injustice in their homeland with their lives and little, if anything, else. In normal times through normal channels New Canadians are absorbed into our country slowly and carefully with a sincere effort to fit them into a community compatible to their social and educational patterns. Present conditions admitting Hungarians to Canada are not normal. Austria, harbouring thousands more people than she can accommodate, must be helped at once.

Our government is doing its best to relieve the situation by reducing red tape to a minimum and by opening Canada's doors wide to admit hundreds of people from Hungary.

Canada's doors are our doors and Mr. Pickerskill's efforts are only as substantial as we make them.

Last Sunday an emergency meeting was held in Cedar Grove to recruit and organize assistance in this area and the Cedar Grove Hungarian Relief Committee was formed. Realizing the extent to which our assistance must be available, this organization is allowing for help beyond the immediate food, shelter, and clothing of the new arrivals and, if possible, beyond Cedar Grove.

Mammoth Farm Machine May be Coming Here

An amazing new multi-purpose farm machine that completely prepares and conditions the soil, plants the seed and packs the earth in one operation is now ready for immediate, mass production after over a year of testing under actual planting conditions.

Developed by the Norton Portland Corporation in Portland, Me., the Wonsover Model 96 will be manufactured for the Maine concern by the Houston, Texas branch of the Todd Shipyard's Corporation. Caterpillar Tractor dealers throughout the world will likely act as selling agents for the Wonsover.

Said by many to be "the greatest advance since the reaper," the 12-ton machine is towed by a tractor. The control panel—attached to the Wonsover by an extension cord—is directly in front of the driver and provides fingertip control of the functions of the machine by means of electrically controlled buttons. The machine will prepare a strip of land 8 feet wide.

The Wonsover can completely prepare and seed one acre per hour, per mile per hour. Depending upon soil conditions, the machine will prepare from 2 to 5 acres an hour. This is approximately 5 to 10 percent of the time required using conventional equipment.

Briefly, here is how the various operations of the machine work:

At the front are two bins for lime and (or) fertilizer and two tanks for weed killer, pest killer or liquid fertilizer. Stainless steel metering sleeves control
