JESUS BAPTIZED AND TEMPTED (Lesson for January 13) Matthew 3 and 4

GOLDEN TEXT - Thou shall worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve. -Matt. 4:10

THE LESSON AS A WHOLE Approach to the Lesson

In last week's Approach we saw the four main movements in the earthly life of Christ as given in Matthew's Gospel. The first of these was a presentation of the King in His preparations. Before going further we should see the items included in this first movement. Briefly stated, they are:

1. The genealogy (1:1-17), in which Matthew presents Christ as the son of Abraham and the Son of David. It is generally accepted that this is the genealogy of Joséph, and it will be noticed that the line comes through Jehoiachin, known also as Jeconiah and Coniah, against whom Jeremiah pronounced the curse, declaring him childless so far as the throne of David was concerned (Jer. 22:30.) Hence our Lord does not derive His right to the throne of David through
