The survey is a 229-page tabulated compilation of what products Canadians buy, what particular brands they buy and where they buy them. Covers 250 Items

It-covers about 250 items of groceries, drug products, toilet goods, clothing, household appliances and other products, and it boils down 11/2 tons of information into 11/2 pounds. The information was gathered-in line with recognized sampling methods - from 40,000 questionaires distributed to householders in 67 towns and cities. Distribution and collection was made by 10,000 newspaper-delivery boys.

Processing of the material was done by Statistical Reporting and Tabulating Ltd., under the direction of C. G. Green, the president. The publication is one
