United Church Board to Study Liquor Question

Appointment of a Church Commission to study the whole temperance issue and the problems related to the use of beverage alcohol will be made at the annual meeting of The Board of Evangelism and Social Service of The United Church of Canada, it was announced last week by Rev. J. R. Mutchmor, Secretary of that Board. The Board meets 26th February to 1st of March 1957.

The official position of The United Church is one of uncompromising hostility to the liquor trade, Dr. Mutchmor said. In 1944 at the London General Council by a three to one vote The United Church affirmed support of the nationalization of the liquor trade as a means of eliminating private profit and monopoly control. This position was reaffirmed at the Windsor General Council last September.

Contention of some United Church members that the position of the moderate drinker and his relation to the Church should be studied is a fair one, Dr. Mutchmor stated. He said he hoped the Commission would give the problem careful consideration.

"The total abstinence programme of The United Church is not a test of membership in the Church; that should be made

strike by Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent. He said the Prime Minister had acted swiftly but without force to bring about a reconciliation.

"The great leadership provided by the Prime Minister," continued Mr. Rye, "gives us a favored position. The Progressive Conservatives are fresh out of ideas."

Mr. Rye reminded his audience that it was the Liberal government who had introduced such social legislation as the family allowance and old age pension. Both measures were opposed by the PCs, he added.

Mr. Rye outlined the types of financial help available to Canadian senior citizens. The Federal government pays 100 percent of the old age pension which is available to every citizen at the age of 70 years. The cost of the old age assistance is shared equally by the provincial and federal governments. A means test is necessary for this help. It is available to those between the ages of 65 and 70 who need financial assistance, and is the same amount as the old age pension—\$40 a month. An individual may own his own home and earn up to \$240 a year and be able to collect this. At the age of 70, he would automatically receive the old age pension, Mr. Rye explained.

For a husband and wife to receive the old age assistance, they must not have a combined income of more than \$1,200 a year, including the assistance. They may own their own home. When extra need is proven, it is available at the municipal level and is handled through the local Welfare officers, Mr. Rye said.

Residents at York Manor, the county's home for the aged, who receive the old age pension, retain \$5.50 of each monthly payment of \$40. They have their clothing and other necessities provided. Tobacco is given the men and candy is provided for the women at York Manor so that the \$3.50 is for extras.
