PROGRAMS AVAILABLE FOR CROP CONVENTION

Programs for the Annual Convention, Ont. Soil & Crop Improvement Assn., Jan. 30 to Feb. 1, may now be secured from offices of Agricultural Representatives or from the Field Crops Branch, Ont. Dept. of Agriculture, Toronto. Daytime meetings will be held in the Coliseum, Exhibition Park, Toronto, at the same time as the Canadian Farm and Industrial Equipment Trade Show. Evening sessions will be at the King Edward Hotel.

A number of excellent speakers will address the meetings on various subjects of interest. Among these will be W. P. Watson, Ontario Live Stock Commissioner, who will speak on "The Agricultural Outlook for 1957"; Dr. D. N. Huntley of the O.A.C. on "Recommended Grain Varieties for 1957"; Dr. R. L. Cook, East Lansing, Michigan on "What's New in Tillage?" and Fritz W. Allmen of Carillon, Quebec will discuss "A New Method of Preserving and Liquefying Farmyard Manure." Attention will also be given to Weed Control, Forage Mixtures and Efficient Use of Fertilizers.

An amazing new multi-purpose farm machine will be on display. This machine completely prepares and conditions the soil, plants the seed, and packs the earth in, one operation. It will prepare from 2 to 5 acres per hour, depending on soil conditions, and can also be used in the reclamation of old pastures or fields that contain small brush.

Arrangements have been made for reduced rail and air rates, and for those who come to the Convention by car there will be ample parking space adjacent to the Coliseum.

More than 1,300 fires occur in an average week across Canada, according to the All-Canada Insurance federation. Total annual cost of fires is more than ninety million dollars.

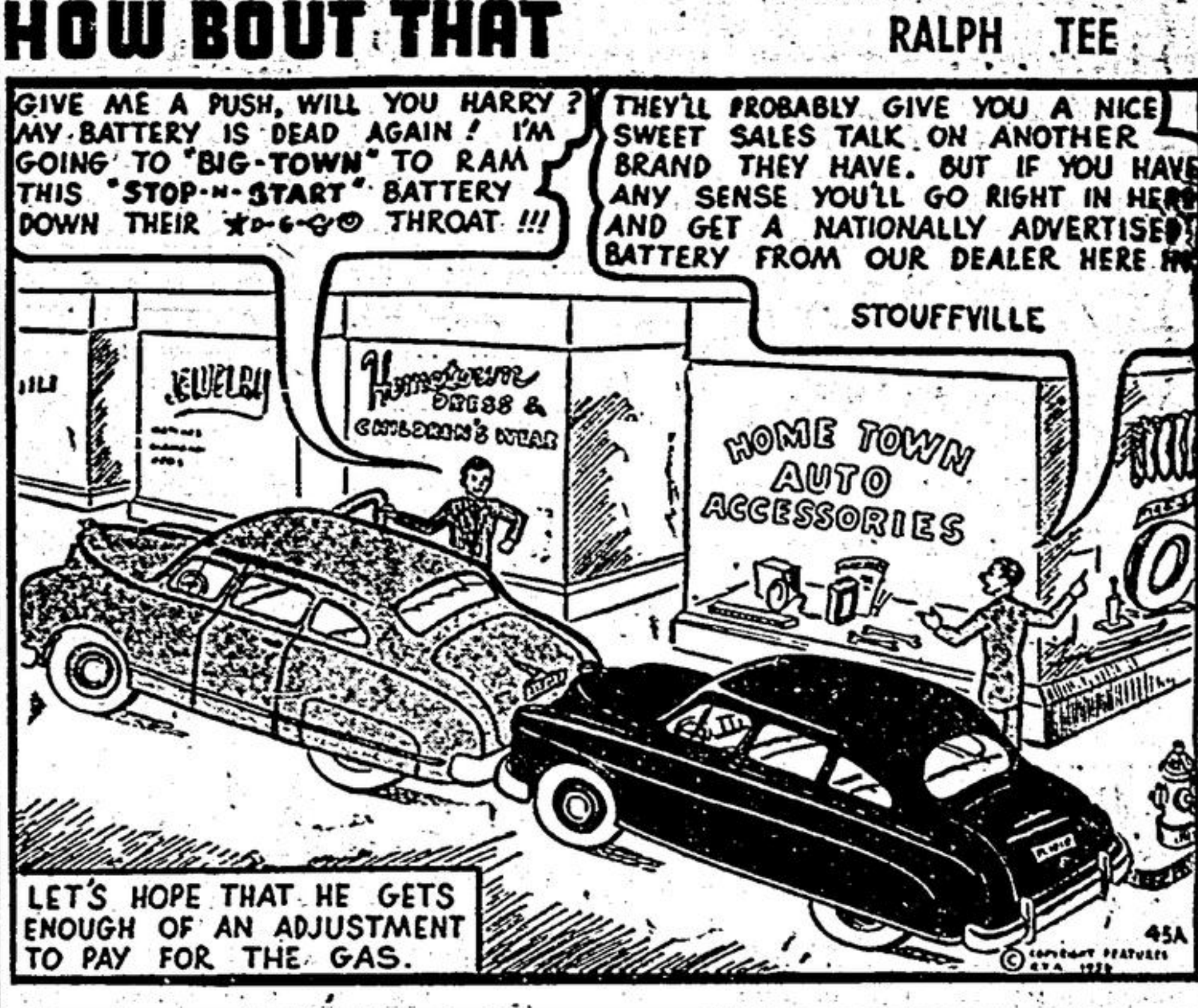
