Planning Board Would Keep Markham Rural

The matter of the house which was moved by Mr. E. Wideman from Toronto to his service station on Don Mills Rd. was brought before Monday's meeting of Markham Twp. Council by the Planning Director. It seems the house contains only 718 sq. ft. floor area by measurement, whereas the by-law requires a minimum of 750 sq. ft. Also, it appears that Mr. Wideman should have obtained a building permit prior to moving the house into Markham Twp. Council passed a motion approving a permit to Mr. Wideman provided that he locate it 150 feet from Don Mills Rd. and that he make sufficient addition to bring it up to at least 750 sq. ft. by June 1, 1957.

The position of the Planning Board on certain issues was made public in the reading of a copy of a letter sent to Murray Jones, Metro Planning Commissioner, by Mr. Sissons. In brief, the letter stated that the Board was not in favour of any plan for solution of sewage disposal problems in Doncaster that did not encompass the whole of the drainage basin. The letter also affirmed the Board's intention to keep Markham Township as farmland for as long as possible. This was the reason the all farm property was zoned industrial as the rumored exploitation of this land for row housing (multiple-family units) is considered highly undesirable.

Councillor James suggested a possible By-law to prevent the use of lots that are low-lying for building purposes. The Reeve stated that the Building Inspector could be requested to make a tour of the Township and draw up a list of such lots. Mr. J. Everlett Harper and Mr. Charles Clifford were appointed to the newly formed Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority.

Holstein Annual Meeting Jan. 30th At Toronto
The annual meeting of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada is scheduled for Wednesday, January 30th, in Toronto. Some 1,200 breeders are expected to attend, largely from Ontario, where 75 per cent of the Association's membership of almost 13,000 is concentrated. Reports covering the most successful year in the Association's history will be presented by President F. C. Eligh, Finch, Ontario, and Secretary George M. Clemons, Brantford, Ontario. Dr. Kenneth Wells, Veterinary Director General for Canada, will speak on the steps that his Department proposes to take in order to eradicate Brucellosis from Canadian cattle. This is a timely subject in which all Canadian cattlemen are interested, since the steps taken will have a definite bearing on the export of cattle from the Dominion over the period of the next few years.

Canadian Cattle Win in Dominican Republic
After flying to Ciudad Trujillo, capital of the Dominican Republic in the West Indies, eleven plane loads of Canadian cattle, representing the Holstein, Jersey, Guernsey, Ayrshire, Shorthorn and Aberdeen Angus breeds, distinguished themselves at the International Fair of Peace and Fraternity of the Free World held there.
A four-year-old Holstein cow, bred by G.E.D. Greene, Agincourt, Ontario, was named Grand Champion female, while Lockwood Lot-O-Monarch, bred by Rockwood Holsteins, St. Norbert, Manitoba, carried off the Grand Championship for males. The latter was purchased by Hacienda Fundacion, owned by General Rafael Trujillo, after he had won similar honours a year ago. A herd of various breeds is maintained at Hacienda Fundacion.
There were four major exhibitors from Canada, Hays Farms, Oakville, Richard Schlessner, Jerseyville, Jack Chambers, Hatchley, and Craig Reid, Georgetown. All did well. Hays won the title of Most Distinguished Exhibitor. This is roughly the equivalent of Premier Exhibitor in Canada. Every Holstein Championship was won by a Canadian bred animal.

Road Men Ask Pay Boost
Employees with the Pickering Township Road Department appeared before Council at a special meeting on Monday evening requesting an increase in pay from \$1.20 per hour to \$1.30. Mr. Ivan Booth acted as spokesman for the group. Mr. Booth explained that the present high cost of living made it necessary for the employees to seek a pay increase.
