

Special Committee on Markham School Problem

A three-man arbitration board was appointed by York County Council on Friday, Feb. 15, to consider a request for the dissolution of the Richmond Hill Union School section. Named to the board are T. A. M. Hulise of Aurora, Leslie Burrows of Sutton and Clarence Downey of Swansea.

The decision to name the board was made by York County Council at its December session when a resolution was presented by Ex Reeve Alf LeMasurier of Markham township and the present reeve, William Clark, requesting the action. It was supported by two ratepayers from Markham Township. In so doing, the council overruled the decision of an earlier arbitration board which had been set up by the three municipalities involved in the dispute.

The three members of the new board are not ratepayers in the area which includes the village of Richmond Hill, Union School Section No. 4 of Vaughan Township and Union School Section No. 3 of Markham Twp. County Clerk Jack Smith will call the first meeting of the board.

Annual Report York County Health Unit

York County Council received the York County Health Unit 1957 budget of \$217,758 at its sessions last week when Dr. Robert King, medical director, presented the annual report. It is an increase of \$50,509 over last year's expenditures.

The county's share of the budget is \$76,256. Last year, the county contributed \$60,000. The request was referred to the Finance Committee.

Warden W. J. Taylor, reeve of Richmond Hill, congratulated Dr. King and his staff as well as the board of directors for the Health Unit on their fine record of work in 1956. He said the protection service carried out by the Unit was of a high calibre.

Chairman Reesor of the Health Unit board praised the work of Dr. King, his assistant, Dr. Douglas Hutchison and the other members of the staff.

Would Restrict Authority Of Metro Planning Board

Reeve Fred Armstrong of Woodbridge on Friday, Feb. 15, referred to the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board as the Gestapo that has removed the democratic rights of fringe municipalities and is strangling development in those areas.

In a resolution to York County Council, Mr. Armstrong called for an amendment to the legislation which set up the planning board. He asked that it either restrict the board's authority to the Metropolitan area or permit representation on the board of fringe municipalities whenever they are affected by board planning.

When the Metropolitan Toronto Planning area was designated, the Metro Planning Board was given jurisdiction over the boundaries of Metropolitan Toronto. There are 13 fringe municipalities within this area, none of whom has representation on the Metro Planning Board.

Sections of Markham Rd. in Richmond Hill, said Deputy Reeve Floyd Perkins, are dotted with dog kennels, clothes lines and gardens because of the board's ruling that the houses should not front on the road.

Mr. Perkins cited a case in which he said the town was instructed by the Metro Board to designate a 100-foot-wide green belt between residential and industrial areas, then later changed its mind about the strip.

"Richmond Hill was not consulted in either case," he said. "Our worries seem to be all over," said Reeve Joseph Fry of Markham Village. "Last week Mr. Gardiner announced he is taking over all our municipalities."

"Can we speak for the other fringe municipalities that are not within York County?" asked Reeve John Perry of Vaughan Township. "A copy of this resolution is being sent to each of them for support," replied Mr. Armstrong.

The policies of the Metro Board received support from only one member of County Council, the Hon. E. M. Daniels of Stouffville said the town would still be without a plan if it had not had the help of the board in gathering planning data.
