Land Erosion, "Act of God" Says Dep.-Reeve

At the regular meeting of Pickering Township Council on Monday evening, a letter was received from the West Rouge Ratepayers Association requesting immediate action to stop the soil erosion caused through the wave action of Lake Ontario. Deputy-Reeve Sherman Scott sald that certain interested parties had made a study of this problem and considered the wave action, causing erosion to be an "act of God" and could not be stopped. Dep. Reeve Scott said that the cost of an eroslon prevention programme would be enormous.

Councillor Glenn Julian contended that the matter should be given serious study. Clerk L T. Johnston pointed out that special committees of the Provincial and Federal Governments had been set up to deal with the problem. Reeve W. G Lawson said he would contact Queen's Park with regard to the matter. Tax Collections

Assessor Wins Appeals Against Division Court

Assessor Archie Fleming of Markham Twp. has received a favorable decision in three of the five assessment appeals taken before the Ontario Municipal Board. Mr. Fleming was appealing against a change made by the local Court of Revision, and sustained by a County Judge.

In three of the cases the Board has re-instated Mr. Fleming's assessment of \$100 an acre. In the fourth, the owner had expressed some desire to subdivide but had, been discouraged by Council, a move which swayed the Court of Revision in reducing the fig-ure to \$50 an acre. The fifth and largest of the appeals is still to be decided by the Municipal Board.
