"Red" was red hot on Thursday night. In the U.S., the majority of people didn't understand the game. The rules of the sport were very vague. The players were merely Canadian imports who chased a rubber disk around a rink, engaged one another in the odd fistic encounter and pocketed a few thousand dollars to take back to Canada in the spring. Now the picture has changed. A number of televised hockey games on Saturday afternoons has done the trick. It must be admitted that the camera work has been excellent, far exceeding the best that Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens could offer. Every game televised from the U.S. has been closely contested. They have included all the thrills of a World Series or a professional football final. Television has "sold" hockey to the United States and their jam-packed arenas are visible proof of its effective presentation.
