**Uxbridge Twp. Wants Game Preserve**

Despite opposition from the Department of Lands and Forests, all speakers at the public meeting Tuesday in the Township Hall, Goodwood, were in favor of a regulated game preserve in Uxbridge Township.

**Dr. C. H. D. Clarke** of the Dept. of Lands & Forests indicated his department would be unsympathetic toward a request by the Township for power to issue hunting licences.

About 80 persons attended the meeting. Some 15 local farmers complained that many non-resident hunters were damaging property and "making a nuisance of themselves" in Uxbridge Township. They felt if a hunter were required to obtain a licence from Township authorities before he could legally hunt in the area, this problem might be solved.

The Township, however, could be empowered by the Department of Lands & Forests to issue licences only for pheasants, rabbits and fox. Dr. Clarke pointed out. He felt this meant the problem of the careless or malicious hunter could not be solved by allowing the Township to set up a controlled preserve.

"Lots of people will still hunt legally without a licence," he declared.

**Mr. Clarke** said his department was against a regulated preserve for two reasons. "This is not a pheasant area," he claimed. "Also the desire here seems to be to do away with hunting. This is not a function of the Department of Lands and Forests."

"Then how can we protect ourselves from malicious damage by careless shooting?" asked Reeve Stuart Ball, chairman of the meeting.

This is already a violation of the Criminal Code, Dr. Clarke replied.

He said he could not see how local farmers and land owners could benefit by a restricted preserve. "It's a question of whether more hunting takes place now than in other Townships which are restricted," he added. Dr. Clarke did not feel this was the case.

Dr. Clarke was asked if a petition signed by an overwhelming majority of Uxbridge Twp. ratepayers for a game preserve would be turned down by the Department of Lands and Forests.

He replied he thought the request should come from the Township council. "The council can speak for the people."

**Earl Dowsell** pointed out that everyone present was in favor of a controlled hunting area. "I think when you go back to the department you should to the department you should Dr. Clarke.

"The department thinks we are not entitled to a restricted area," summed up Reeve Ball. "We'll have to see whether we can convince them otherwise."

**Councillor Robert Nesbitt** said after the meeting the question would "almost certainly" be raised at the next Uxbridge Township council meeting.

Other speakers were **Sydney Pugh**, Pickering Township councillor, who described how his Township had gone about setting up a game preserve, and **Dr. Alan Seord**, who declared himself in favor of the proposal.

"There are so many people who want to hunt, it may sometimes conflict with the interests of people who live in the community," he said.

Reeve Ball announced another ratepayers' meeting would be held next Wednesday at the Township Hall, Goodwood, to discuss the flooding of the Goodwood area.

**Deer Rampage Through Markham Tp. Nurseries**

Markham Township Council was informed Monday in a letter from the Dept. of Lands & Forests that the Crown cannot be held responsible for damage done to the property of Edean Nurseries by deer. It was reported deer had damaged the Edean property to the extent of \$18,000. The letter stated the Edean firm could use any means at its disposal to drive away the deer but they could not kill them.

Council expressed dissatisfaction with the letter and instructed the clerk to confer further with the departmental officials. A report will also be secured from Township Game Warden E. Harper.

At council's regular meeting this week, it was reported that the game warden had been unsuccessful in trying to chase

the deer with the use of dogs. Reeve W. L. Clarke suggested the problem could be solved by a two-day hunt with shotguns. Although there was some opposition, to this in the Township, "it's possible we may have to do something like that," he declared.

"Why can't the Department of Games & Fisheries go in and shoot them, like they do beavers?" asked Councillor Mrs. Kathleen James.

"I guess beavers are easier to catch," quipped Reeve Clark. J. D. Lucas, council solicitor, said Township authorities had no right to shoot the deer. "The only thing to do is to write to the Department of Game and Fisheries saying citizens are complaining."

Council decided to adopt this suggestion.

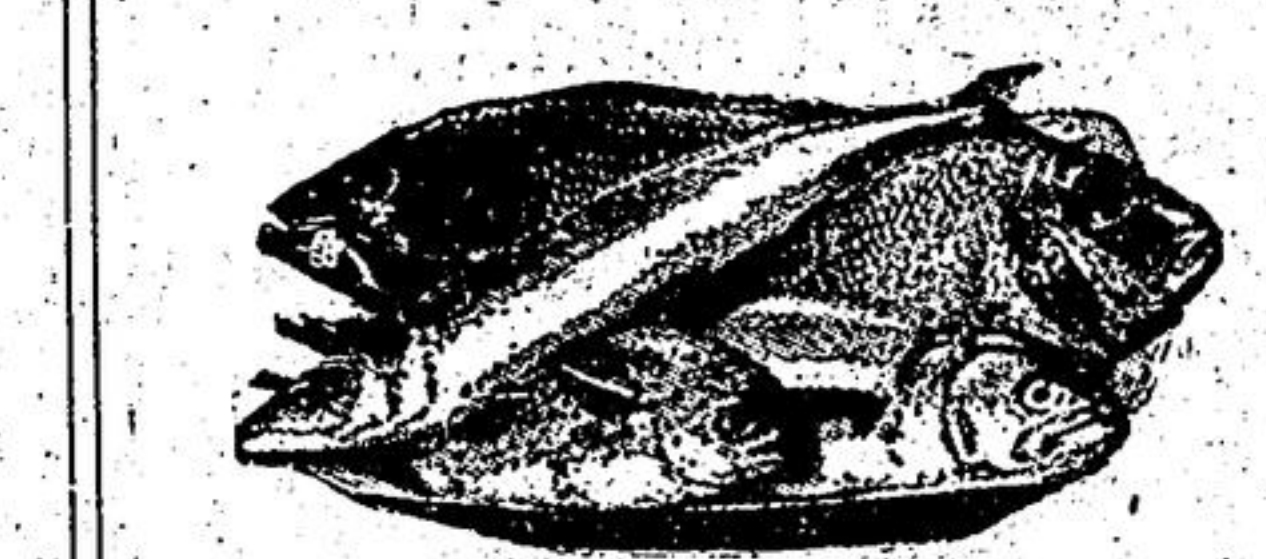
**Parents' Night**
