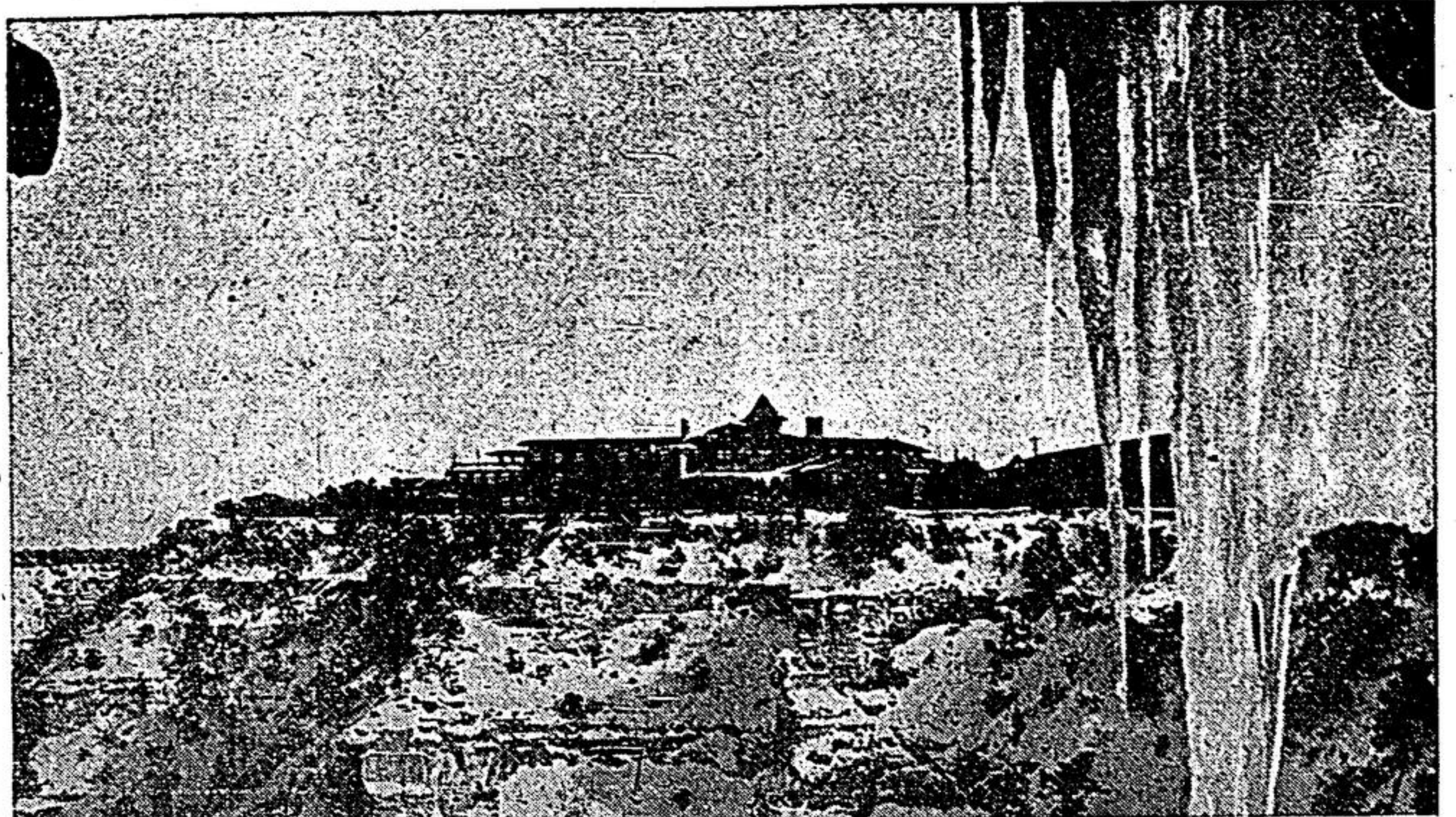


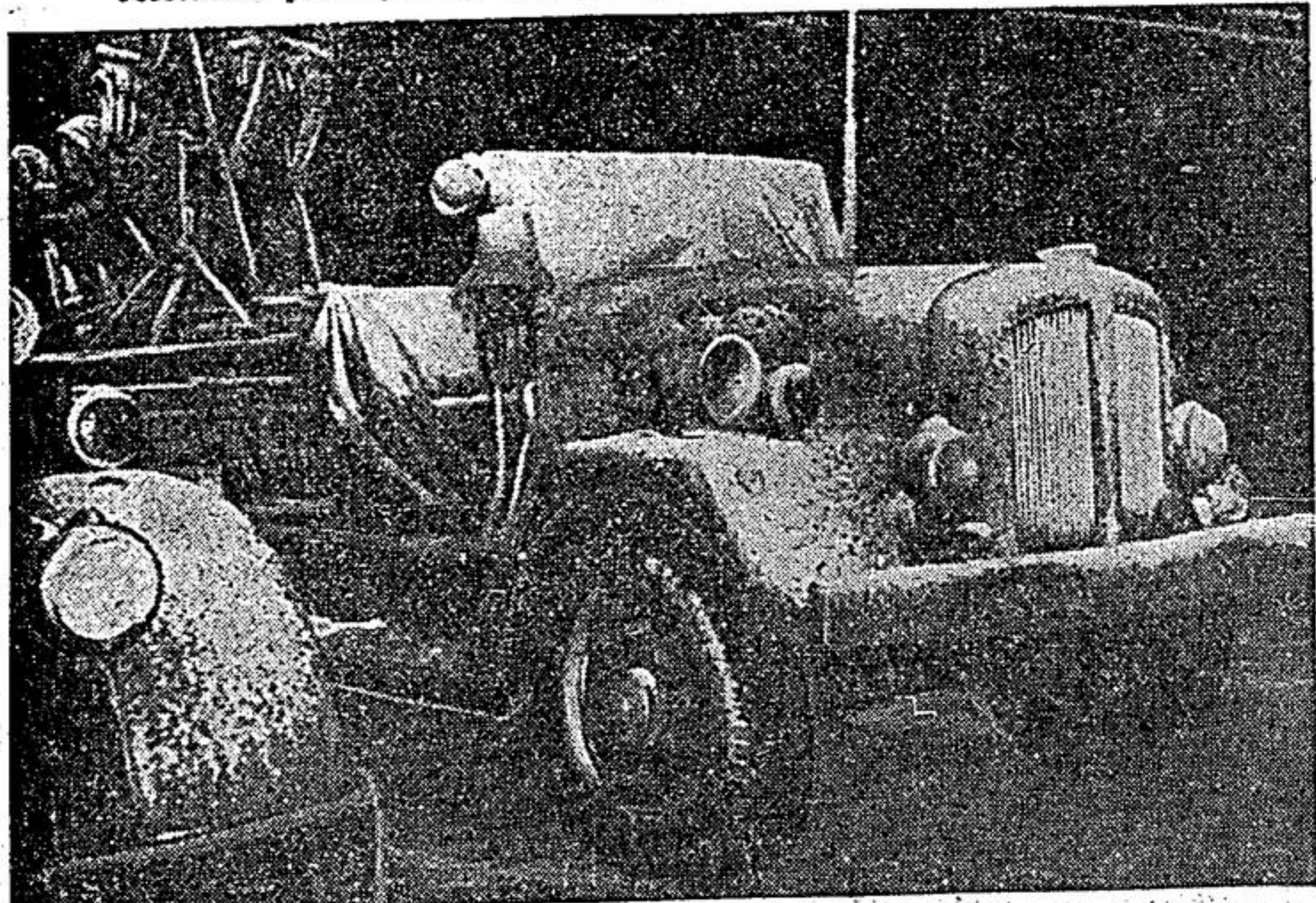

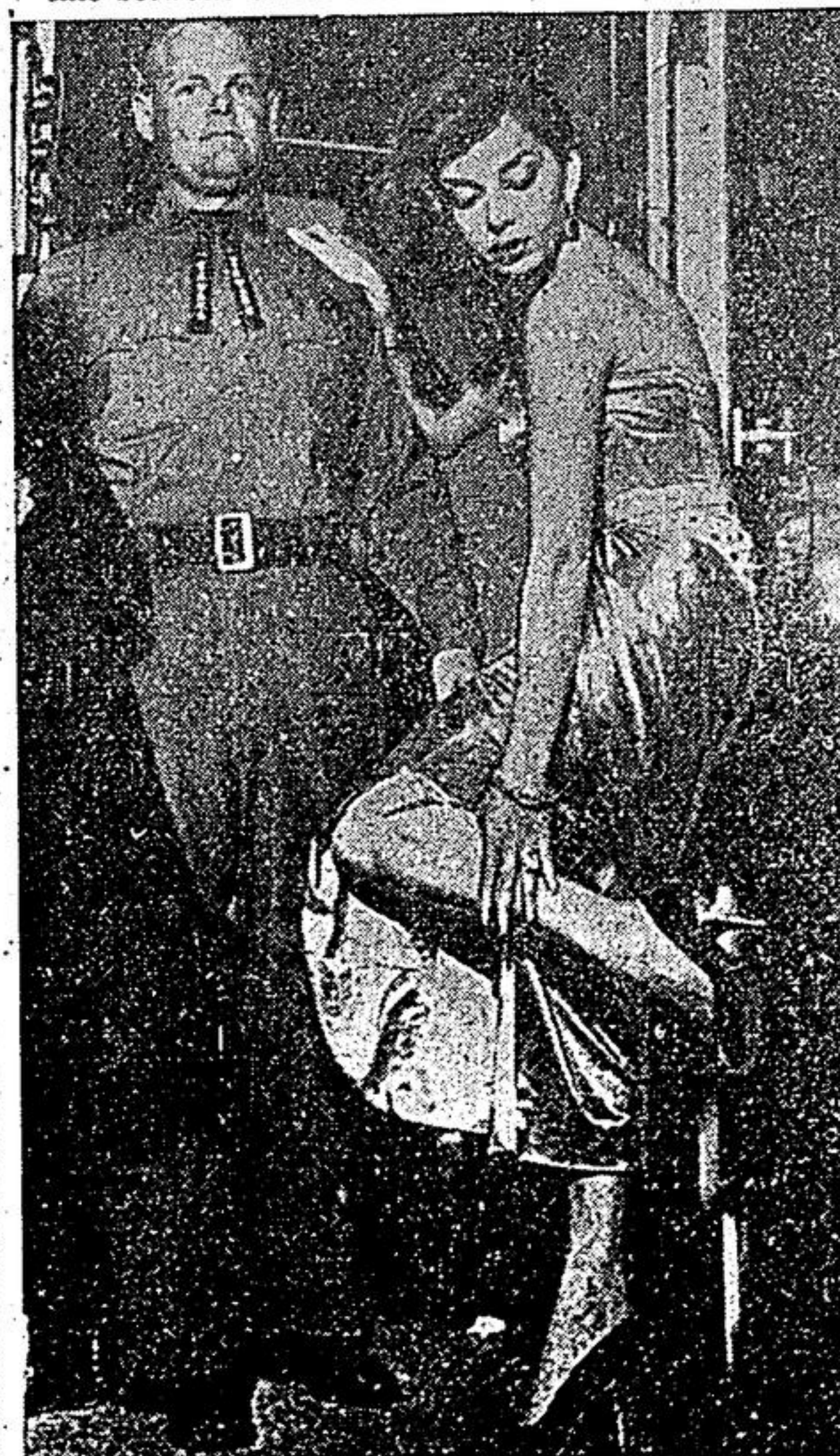

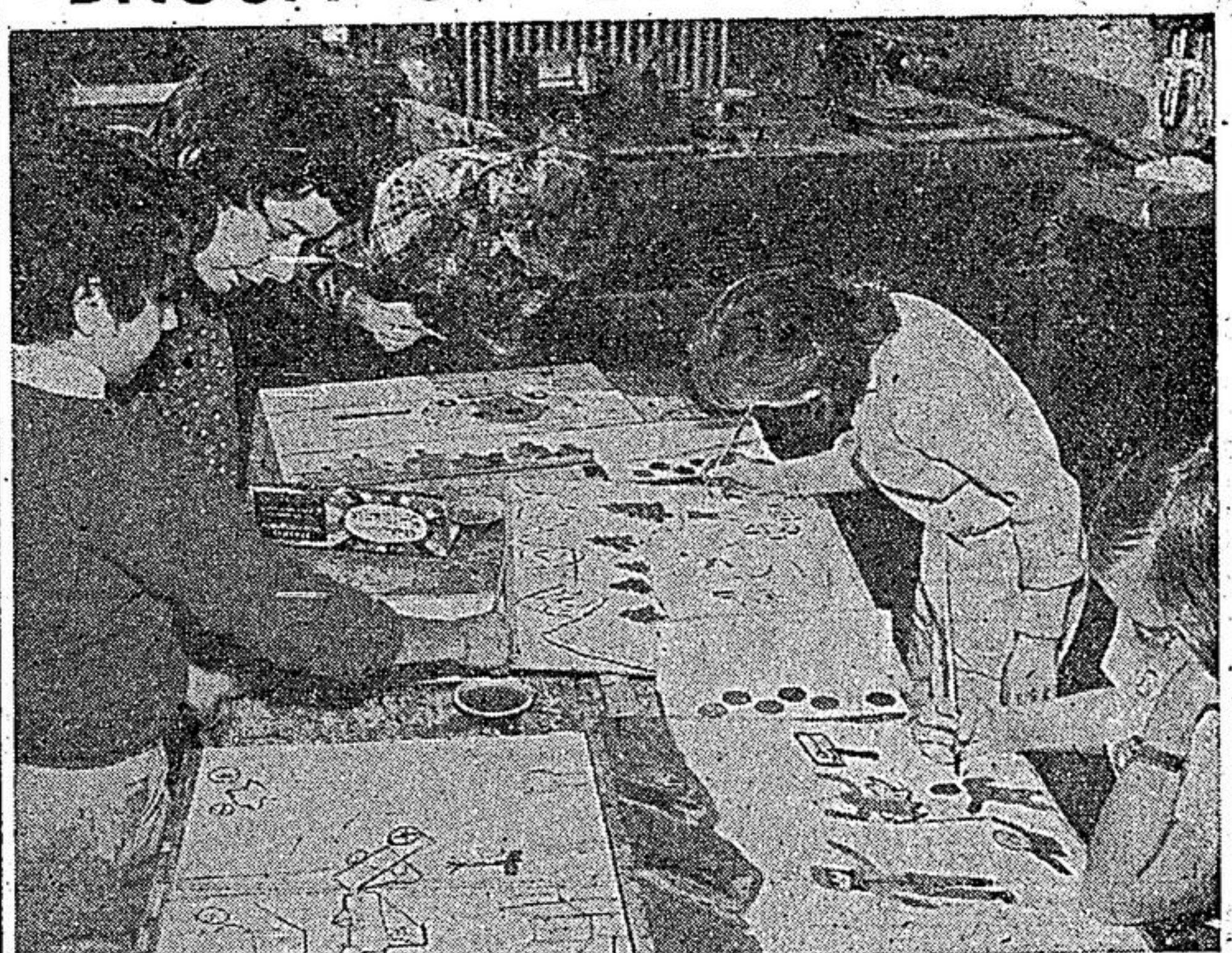

BRUSH UP ON SAFETY



Grade school children are working on a painting-safety project at the university.

WHEN is an art class not strictly an art class? When it teaches safety practices as Pennsylvania State university does. The full name for this special project is the Safety Education for Public Schools committee. Associate Prof. Dr. Edward Mattil is in charge of the class which develops a series of motivations for children of the first three grades. It works like this—pupils are told about a girl who left her toys on the steps or a boy who was careless in climbing a tree. Then, motivated by these stories, they draw or paint what has happened. In this way, the children are impressed with the safety lesson. A discussion of the paintings is held and the work is then exhibited for fond parents of the pupils.
