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Crowds Attend Funeral Of Mrs. G. M. Forsyth

One of the largest crowds on record paid their final respects to the late Mrs. G. M. Forsyth at the funeral service on Monday afternoon in the Claremont Baptist Church. Mrs. Forsyth, the former Lillian M. Cooper, passed away at the family residence on Friday evening. She was in her 81st year.

Although the deceased had been in failing health for a number of years, her friendly personality and active participation in various promotions and projects had gained her a wide circle of friends in the village, township and county. Accommodation in the church auditorium was inadequate and many were seated in the Sunday School room which was equipped with a loud speaker service.

The service was conducted by the church pastor, Rev. J. S. Lowden, assisted by a former minister, Rev. G. Davison and Rev. H. Lackey. Interment was made in the Claremont Union Cemetery. The pallbearers were Messrs. Earle Cook, Voe Ward, Dick Cooper, Kenneth Ward, Donald Hedges and Harold Cooper. Honourary pallbearers were Messrs. Frank Underhill, Clarke Rawson, George Rawson and Charles Cooper. The flower bearers were Gary Cooper, Herbert Forsyth, Ralph Madill, Samuel Seaver and Edwin Seaver.

Mrs. Forsyth was born in Claremont, Dec. 5, 1876, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Cooper. On Oct. 19, 1898 she was married to Mr. G. Malcolm Forsyth, who survives. The couple marked their 58th wedding anniversary last fall.

A former member of the Methodist Church, the deceased attended the Baptist Church following her marriage. While in good health, she took an active part in local and district organizations. She was a Past President of the Claremont Branch of the Women's Institute, a Director of the South Ontario W.I., and served on the Mothers' Allowance and Old Age Pension Board for the County of Ontario.

Besides her husband, she leaves to mourn her passing, two daughters, Viola and Georgia, both of Claremont; three sisters, Mrs. J. A. Rawson of Toronto, Mrs. Walter Ward of Claremont, Mrs. W. S. Cook of Willowdale and one brother, Mr. Frank Cooper of Claremont. A daughter, Mary, one brother and three sisters are deceased.

These missionaries were shown with their wives; also the aeroplane in which they flew over Indian territory, and the landing strip where they endeavoured to make a friendly contact with these natives. Later their bodies were found here by the rescue party and they were buried at the place where they had so nobly laid down their lives for their love for Christ and for the Indians. The widows of these fine missionaries, with their children are bravely continuing missionary work in Ecuador.

Miss Cuthbertson closed her message with an earnest and solemn appeal for volunteers for the service of Christ Jesus, both in active missionary endeavour, and in holding the ropes at home by prayer and faithful support.
