it was inecessary that similar problems all over the municipality be financed by the entire township.

On a query from Mr. Robert Beach as to the method of paying for such a project, Reeve Ball answered that a debenture issue over a period of years would be the proper way. He said that if the scheme was paid for in one year, it would mean an eight and one-half mill increase on the tax rate.

"Such an expenditure isn't going to break the township," stated Mr. Geo. Todd. "We purchased a \$15,000 maintainer and paid for it in two years," he said. "Flooding here in Goodwood

is a real health problem," noted Reeve Ball, "it is possible that in-a matter of a few years, the Department of Health would force us to take some action." Mr. Murray Stewart informed the meeting that the Dept. of Health had investigated the situation in 1950. "They will force it sooner or later," said Mr.

"The health problem must be given serious consideration," stated Deputy-Reeve Dowswell. "We can't measure health in dollars and cents." Dep. Reeve Dowswell noted that pollution caused through flooding and inadequate drainage could bring about an . epidemic of typhoid. "By paying a little we may save life," he said.

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
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
