**Ringwood Girl a Grad
As Mennonite School
Has Golden Jubilee**

The Ontario Mennonite Bible School celebrated its 50th anniversary at the annual commencement exercises at First Mennonite Church, The winter Bible School has been conducted in Kitchener since 1907.
Pioneer of the project was the late Bishop Samuel Frederick Coffman of Vineland.
He was convinced that if a weekend Bible conference was a blessing to the church then surely a longer period would redouble the spiritual blessing.
Because of this conviction and publicizing it, the Ontario Mennonite conference in 1906 passed a resolution "That this conference encourage the holding of Bible study following the annual Bible conference, said study to continue several weeks." This was the beginning of the OMBS.
The first session of four weeks was held in 1907. Today the school holds annually a 12-week term extending from the beginning of January to the end of March. In addition to this period of Bible study on a high school level, there has arisen another school in its own right on a Junior Bible College level. This school is called Ontario Mennonite Bible Institute and covers a concentrated period of study for five months extending from November to the end of March.
In his commencement address last night, Bishop J. B. Martin noted well over 2,000 students and graduates recorded on the register books of OMBS. These young men and women are presently serving the church as bishops, ministers, deacons, Sunday school superintendents, teachers, youth leaders; mission workers (home and foreign), voluntary service workers and as Christian
