The competition consisted of judging classes of oats, barley, wheat, red clover and alfalfa, and giving reasons on one class of each. Besides this the contestants were required to identify twenty weed mounts and ten grass or legume seeds and mounts.

Durham county's team, under the expert coaching of E. A. Summers, agricultural representative, won the Agricultural Chemicals Challenge Trophy for the high team score.
