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Home and School Discuss Six to Twelve Year Olds

The April meeting of the Stouffville Home & School proved to be thought-provoking and highly informative. Parent Education Leader, Mrs. H. R. Button, reviewed the study book, "Your Child from 6 to 12," referred to articles by Dr. Marion Hilliard, and other sources. In her talk, Mrs. Button, drawing on practical experience and thoughtful observation of children, contributed much to a better understanding of them. Some of the thoughts presented by Mrs. Button were: Our children live in a different world to that in which we grew up. Changing living conditions, labour-saving devices, smaller family units, parent working conditions, outside recreation, etc., while external things, all tend to affect their inner lives, their thinking, feeling and acting. Reference was made to a survey made in which children kept a record for a week of how much time their father was able to give them individual attention—the average time per child per week was 7½ minutes. Our world has been speeded up and is now closely-knit so that, for example, events in Egypt make their impact upon us here, and upon our future. Our family is a tiny world in which we learn group living. It is in the family our children learn the skills which later they combine with others so making their impact upon society. 6-12 years is the time when a child is all set for a great deal of learning. He can grasp many kinds of new ideas. Reading aloud in the family circle is recommended as a way of stimulating mental activity, and affording much pleasure. Most

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
