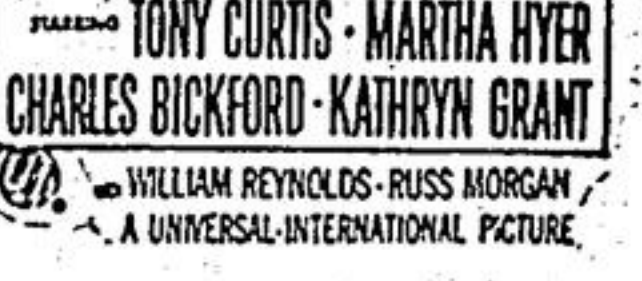

Death of Dr. Norman Causes Some Concern at Oak Ridges

Rev. Gordon Winch, pastor of St. Paul's United Church, Oak Ridges and Lake Wilcox, told a press reporter that he was going to write a letter to the Hon. Lester Pearson concerning the death last week of E. Herbert Norman, Canadian Ambassador to Egypt. Dr. Norman's death followed a smear campaign by U.S. officials. Mr. Winch said he was going to "protest the existence and action of the U.S. committee and express the concern of the community over the lack of human value taken in the whole situation." His decision came last week, before he discovered that the Norman family was once prominent in this district and remembered by many older residents.

In addition to his own letter, the Rev. Mr. Winch asked members of his congregation to also write Mr. Pearson, giving their views on the subject, as many residents knew the Norman family well. Special prayers were said for Herbert Norman at both morning and evening services at St. Paul's last Sunday.

Parents of Herbert Norman were former residents of Aurora. They owned the house at 94 Wellington Street East, Aurora, bought from them by one of the town's oldest business men, F. Davis. Mr. Norman's father, Rev. Daniel Norman, was born in Oak Ridges, where the latter's father was a farmer for many years. Dr. Herbert Norman was born in Japan.

MISSIONARY AT SUNRISE SERVICE

Rev. Weyburn C. Johnson of Brown City, Michigan, who has just returned from his missionary duties in India, will be speaking in the United Missionary Church in Stouffville in the Sunrise Service which will commence at 7:00 a.m.

Mr. Johnson left for India on November 1, 1950, and has served under the United-Missionary Society in the area about 200 miles west of Calcutta, which is assigned to that Mission. His work has been varied, consisting of village evangelism, Bible School work, Pastor of an English-speaking Anglo-Indian community, and director of a religious book club designed for circulation of good Christian literature.

Mr. Johnson has traveled considerably in India, visiting the work of other missions as well as places of world famous interest. His return journey to America took him through Burma, Thailand, Hong Kong, Formosa and Japan.

Mr. Johnson will speak in the Sunrise Service on the subject, "The Power of the Resurrection." He will also speak in the 11 a.m. service on the subject, "The Extended Right Hand," to be held in the Stouffville United Missionary Church.
