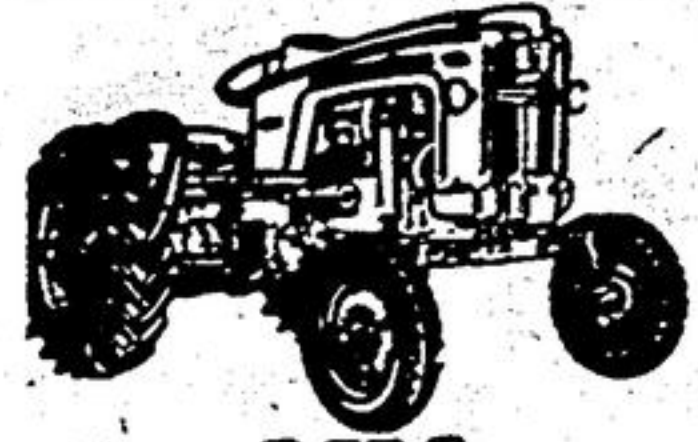

Watch Your Valuables While On Vacation

Each year, while owners are on vacation, hundreds of Canadian homes are ransacked by burglars. Home burglaries represent a large portion of the \$1,500,000 theft loss in Canada each year, according to officials of the All Canada Insurance Federation.

The Federation, which represents more than 200 competing Canadian fire, casualty and automobile insurance companies, offers these recommendations to guard against home burglary while on vacation.

- (1) Have milk and newspaper deliveries cancelled. Old newspapers are a sure indication that the resident is away.
- (2) Arrange to have your lawn cared for regularly.
- (3) Inform the local police that you will be away. They will check your home periodically.
- (4) Have a friend or neighbor visit the house occasionally to see that all is in order.
- (5) Remove valuable silver or jewelry for storage in a bank safety deposit box.
- (6) Do not leave light burning in the house.
- (7) Ask the local newspaper not to mention that you will be away. Professional burglars read the social columns regularly.
- (8) If a theft or break-in is discovered, inform police immediately. Even if nothing of value has been taken, the information will be of value to police.

Eating In The Old Days

Do gentlemen eat as much as they once did? The answer seems to be no.

The by-laws called for a neat and plain supper, "to observe that frugality which becomes a charitable society." Here is what they ate, as noted in the minutes:

We suppose 40 or 50 members were in attendance the evening of Sept. 3, 1755. What kind of a spread was provided?

In 1755 the St. Andrew's Society of Philadelphia, then six years old, had a dinner-meeting, probably at the Tun, tavern in Water street.

"Two hams, 24 pounds; round of beef, 23 pounds; sirloin of beef, 29 pounds; four tongues; dozens of fowls; side of lamb; 10 pounds of veal; pigeon pie; pound of butter; horse-radish; a salad, mustard and vinegar; five pounds of cheese; 10 six-penny loaves."

Our figures add up to better than 120 pounds of meat, not counting the pigeon pie. That's pretty good eating, even with the horse-radish to sharpen their appetites. In those days a dinner began around three p.m. and might not break up until 10 or 11. It still seems a lot of food.

What would those old heroes have made of a \$100 a plate dinner, consisting of half a grapefruit, a cup of broth, six ounces of chicken, a scoop of potatoes, a spoon of peas, Neopolitan ice cream and coffee? Short work, obviously, considering if some sort of trifle designed to keep members quiet while the real dinner was cooking.

Now and then we hear of eating contests and drinking contests. In all other sporting events the records show that modern men excel their great-grandfathers. But when it comes to squaring away at a table and tucking into a hearty meal, today's eaters couldn't even qualify for a light supper at the Tun tavern.

Weed Control Starts In Advance Of Growth

With the beginning of spring growth, weeds too come to life, and before they emerge from the soil is the time to start the season's weed control program, reports the Field Crops Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

This pre-emergent weed control may be divided into two parts—cultural and chemical. Cultural control, which is an older method, consists of the use of the harrow, rotary hoe and finger weeder in the destruction of germinating weed seedlings prior to, and just after, the emergence of a crop such as corn or soybeans. Only the top one or two inches of soil should be worked so that no more weed seeds will be brought up to the surface where they will germinate.

Pre-emergent chemical control is the application of chemical weed killers to the soil surface before the weeds and crop emerge from the ground. The chemical is applied when the crop is sown or before it shows above the ground. This method is known as the "Preventive Approach to Weed Control" because weeds are destroyed before they start to compete with the crop for plant food and moisture.

Pre-emergent treatments give promise of weed control in several crops susceptible to chemical and which could not be sprayed after they have emerged from the ground. The chemicals control the weeds by killing small weed seedlings that are starting to grow and by establishing a toxic layer of chemical on top of the soil which either stops weed seed germination or kills young seedlings which come in contact with this layer. With these treatments the crop must be tolerant to the chemical at the seedling stage or the toxicity must have disappeared before the crop emerges. Great care must be taken to choose chemicals and rates of application which kill the weeds but leave the crop unharmed.

The Field Crops Branch emphasizes the importance of following the manufacturer's directions implicitly when applying chemical weed killers.

Kitchen Most Dangerous Room

Neglect, carelessness, and improper use and handling of modern labour-saving appliances have made the kitchen the most dangerous room in the house, says Prof. J. W. Garland, Agricultural Engineering Department, Ontario Agricultural College.

Basement stairways without handrails or riser boards cause many accidents to wives and children. Stairs are built for up and down travel, and should not be used for storage of boots, overshoes, jars, and boxes. Highly polished floors are dangerous to walk on, and may unintentionally treat house guests to a "flying entrance."

Electrical hazards, such as the improper use of long, inadequate extension cords, cause fires and deaths. Most circuits in homes should have 15 ampere fuses. Since the majority of electrical circuits are of No. 14 wire the use of larger than 15 amp fuses is a definite hazard. When

a fuse "blows", do not replace it with a larger one; instead, decrease the load on that particular circuit and have your electrician install another circuit, says the O.A.C. authority.

The following suggestions are made: don't leave electric irons unattended; don't handle appliances or cords while in contact with water; don't replace fuses while standing on a wet floor unless you first pull the main switch; don't place radiant heaters too close to inflammable material and don't attempt to make electrical repairs yourself.

Fire hazards include petroleum-type cleaners, overheated stoves or furnaces, rubbish, and neglected chimneys. Never use kerosene or gasoline to "quick-en" a fire; explosions and burns may result. Open fireplaces should be shielded by a metal screen to protect rugs from flying sparks.

Dozens of home safety hints are given in Circular 237—"Safety in the Home," obtainable at the office of the agricultural representative.



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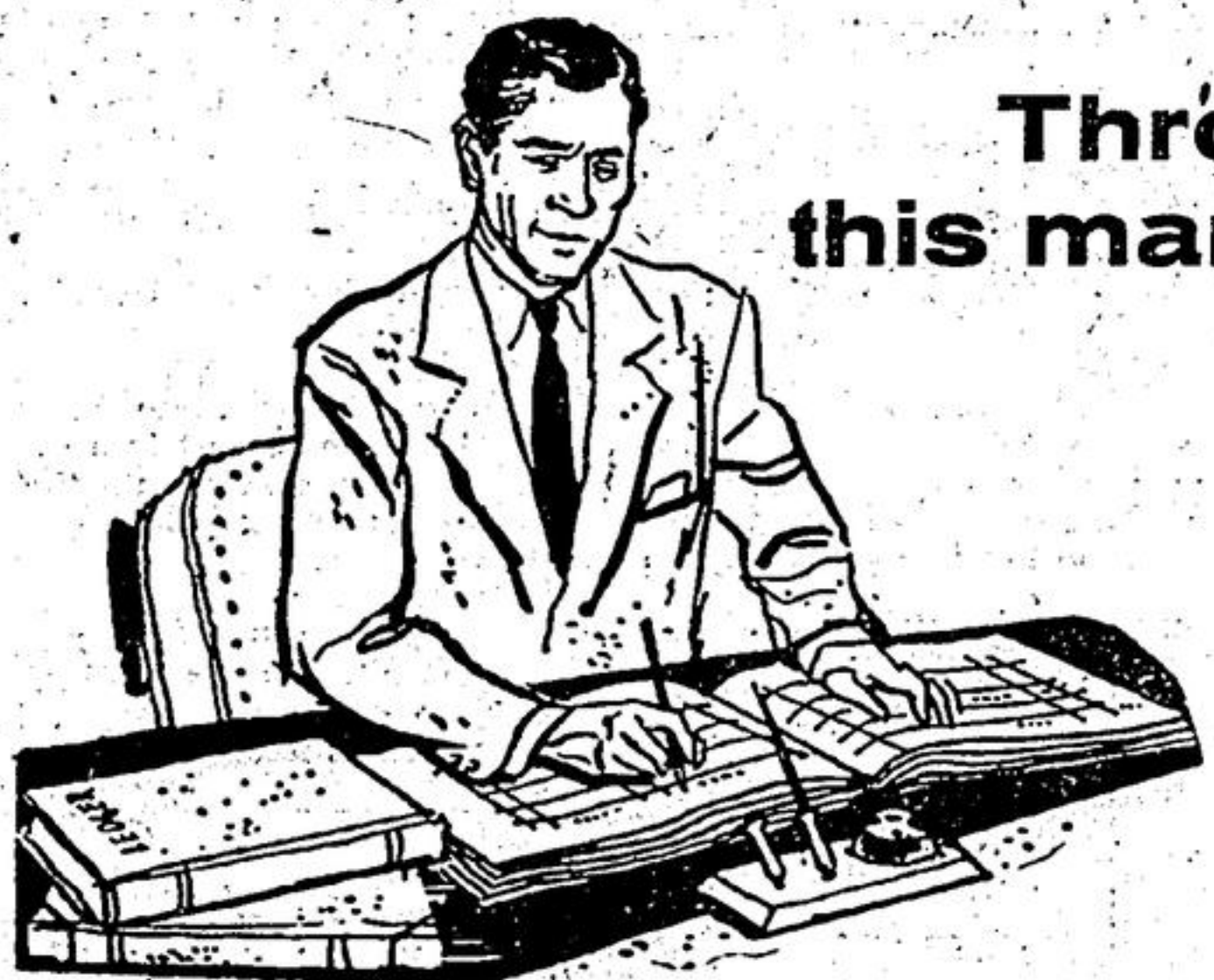
