A Health Unit, to serve the 3 municipalities of Pickering Twp., Pickering Village and the Town of Ajax will go into operation on July 1.

The Unit will be known as the Pickering-Ajax Health Unit, although it is expected other municipalities will join the Unit before long.

The Health Unit Committee met recently and voted to employ the following personnel: Dr. W. E. MacBean, Director, and M.O.H.; Miss Margaret Atkinson, Supervisor of Public

Health Nursing; Mr. John Robson, Chief Sanitary Inspector.

Mr. Wm. G. Newman has been appointed to the Health Unit by the Provincial Dept. of Health. Reeve W. G. Lawson represents Pickering Twp. and Councillor Gordon H. Bray, for Pickering Village, and Reeve John Mills, for the Town of Ajax.

RESERVE JUDGMENT IN CHARGES AGAINST YOUTH

Judgment has been reserved two weeks in the case of a 16-year-old Claremont youth charged with driving while intoxicated. Robert Redshaw appeared before Magistrate F. S. Ebbs in the Whitby police court to answer the drunk driving charge and a careless driving charge.

P.C. Ross MacMartin, of the Whitby Detachment of the OPP, stated that he had found a car in a ditch on the ninth concession of Whitby Twp. on the evening of April 16. He said that he found skid marks of more than 400 feet leading to the car. Redshaw, he said, was at the scene and, in his opinion, was intoxicated. P.C. Charles Whiteside, who had accompanied P.C. MacMartin to the scene, also stated that Redshaw was intoxicated.

Redshaw said he had consumed four bottles of beer earlier that day in Oshawa. "I felt no effect at all," he told defense counsel Charles Kerr.

He said he was passing another car when he saw an oncoming car. In an effort to avoid this car, he said, he had skidded into the ditch.

He admitted to Crown Attorney Alex C. Hall, Q.C., that he had that morning paid a fine in Whitby for having liquor. He also stated that he had never consumed four bottles of beer in one day before.

Judgment is to be handed down on May 28.

850 Candidates Expected in Field Compared to Record 954 in 1945

Number of candidates for the June 10 Dominion election reached 725 last week, according to a compilation by the Canadian Press. Indications are that the final total will be about 850.

GOODWOOD

Analysis of nominations so far indicates the field will be smaller than in the 1953 election when 896 names went on the ballots for the 265 House of Commons seats. The record high was 954 for 245 seats in 1945. The 1949 total was 848 for 262 seats.

Closes on May 27

Nominations close Monday, May 27, two weeks before voting day in 242 constituencies, two of which elect two members apiece. They close next Monday in 21 large, scattered constituencies where they are held four weeks ahead to allow time to deliver ballots and other election materials.

The Liberals have candidates

nominated for all but two seats, although one of them bears a Liberal-Labor label. Their only vacancies are in Shelburne-Yarmouth-Clare in Nova Scotia and Grey-Bruce in Ontario, where Finance Minister Harris is expected to be nominated. Both nominations will be held in a few days.

The Progressive Conservatives, who expect to contest all 265 seats, have 220 candidates in the field. They have full slates in Prince Edward Island's 10 in Nova Scotia's 14. They have still to name candidates in two of Nova Scotia's seven, two of Newfoundland's 10, 34 of Quebec's 75, one of Ontario's 85, three of Saskatchewan's 17, two of Alberta's 17 and one of Brit-

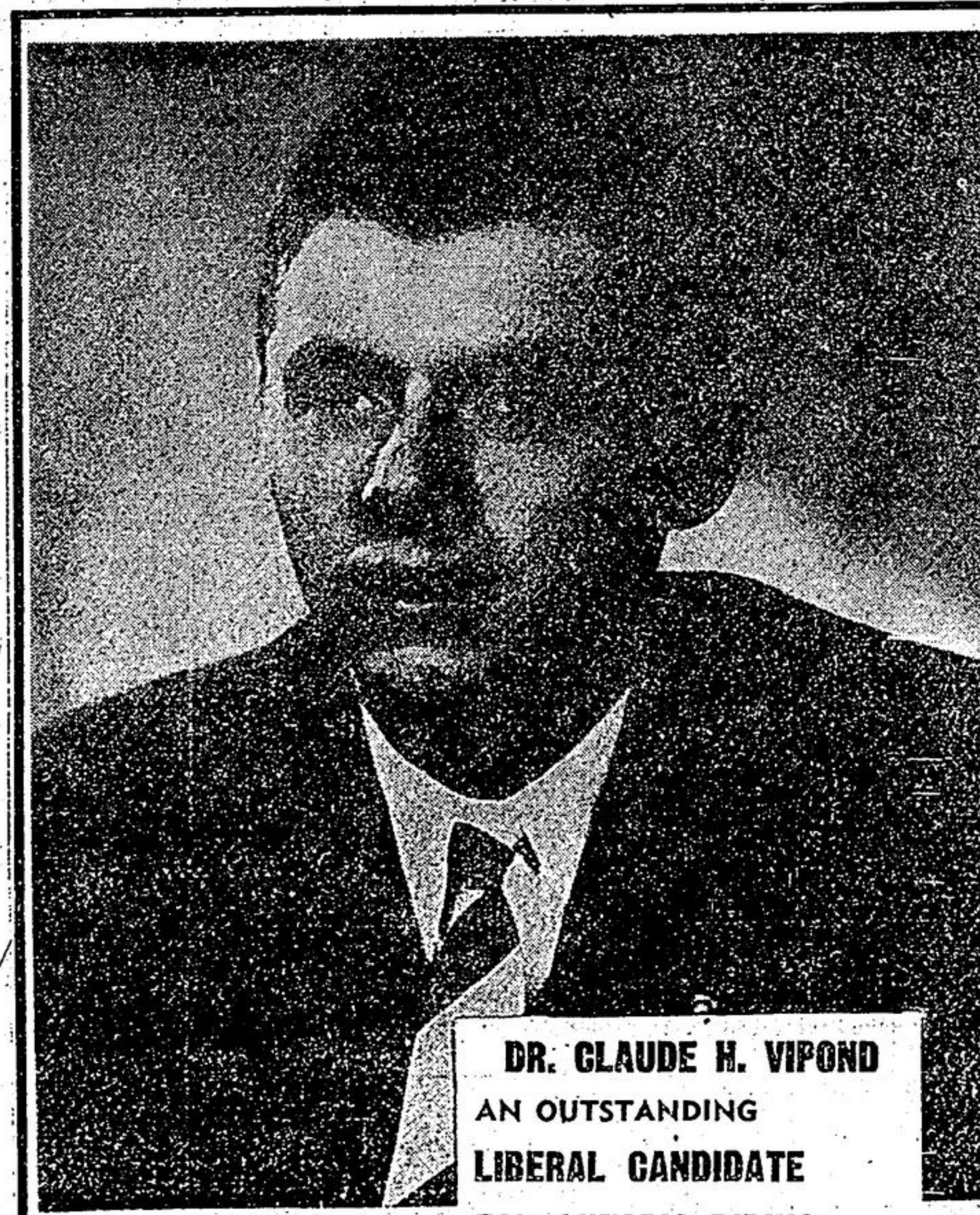
