REPEAT PERFORMANCE

Their moundmen have been given little support at the plate however, having been held to less than a half-dozen hits. Ringwood, a new entry in the circuit, was badly beaten in the initial start but the loss was due to one bad inning when the opposition racked up six of their seven runs. That's how they stack up after one week of competition. Next September the real story can be told.

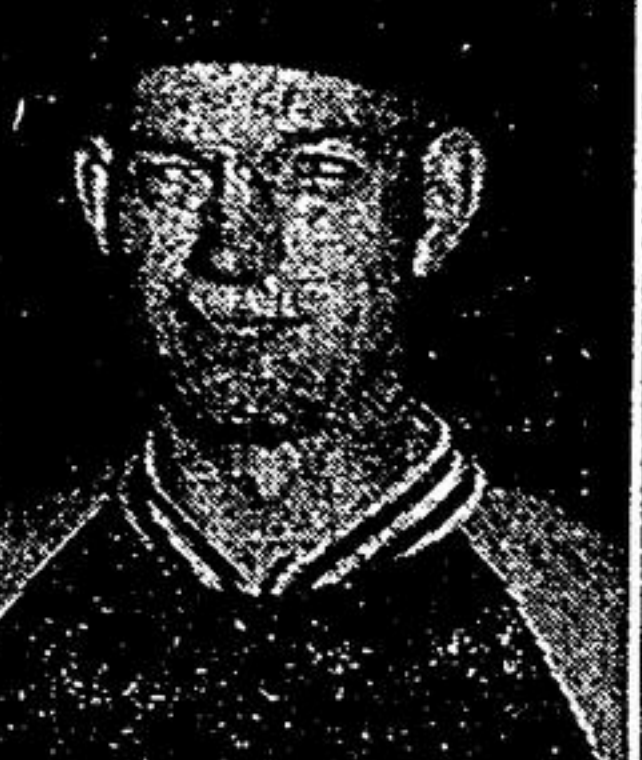
GIRLS PLAN ENTRY FOUR TEAM GROUP

Pickering Recreation Must Re-organize or Lose Grant

Mr. Jack Ibeck, a representative from the Dept. of Education appeared before Pickering Twp. Council on Tuesday evening. He informed the members that under the municipalities' present recreational system, the Department would cease to pay grants after this year. He pointed out that the Department were interested only in subsidizing a township-wide recreational program and not any one isolated area.

Mr. Ibeck suggested two alternatives which might be adopted by the township—individual representation to be financed without subsidy, or re-organization of existing recreation committee to serve the entire municipality. Clerk Lloyd Johnston pointed out that a recreation committee was in operation comprising two members of council and five outside members. He said he believed this group would be agreeable to giving up their positions in favour of township-wide representation. Members of council will submit the names of five persons who might be willing to serve on such a committee. The Reeve suggested that one representative from each ward might be a fair arrangement if the proper parties could be found.

Mr. Ibeck pointed out that the Department of Education would pay a percentage of operational and instructional costs if all recreational services were handled by a township-wide committee. He stated that a full-time Recreational Director and Secretary could be appointed when needed.

"I'm not trying to hold a gun to your head," said Mr. Ibeck, "but when we start subsidizing one area only, then we're in trouble." The one area served by the Dept. of Education at the present time is East Woodlands. The Representative said that if the township wished to create such a committee, he would be willing to assist in the organization of the programme. He pointed out that the Department had no connection with any school programme under the jurisdiction of a School Board.

Deputy-Reeve Sherman Scott stated that he didn't believe the Recreation Committee now organized was representative of the whole township. Reeve Lawson noted that he believed the members would be co-operative in setting up a new committee that would have township-wide representation.
