Ballantrae Man is Fatally Injured in Car and Truck Crash

Llewellyn Peterson, a resident of Ballantrae, died in the Oshawa General Hospital on Monday from injuries suffered in a transport truck accident on Highway 401. He was trapped in the twisted wreckage of the cab. The driver of the tractor-trailer, Harold Snowball, also of Ballantrae, suffered facial lacerations.

The deceased was rushed to the Oshawa Hospital where his leg was amputated. He passed away in the evening from shock and loss of blood. The funeral service will be held on Thursday afternoon at 2.30 from the Theaker and Drewery Funeral Home, Mount Albert, with interment in the Mount Albert Cemetery.

He is survived by his wife, the former Nellie Gedge and one daughter, Mrs. Cecil Stickwood, (Margaret). He was in his 64th year.

Snowball's transport collided with a milk delivery truck which was stalled on the highway. The big vehicle, loaded with bagged cement, jack-knifed and overturned. The driver said he was unable to pass the delivery truck as another car was passing his transport.

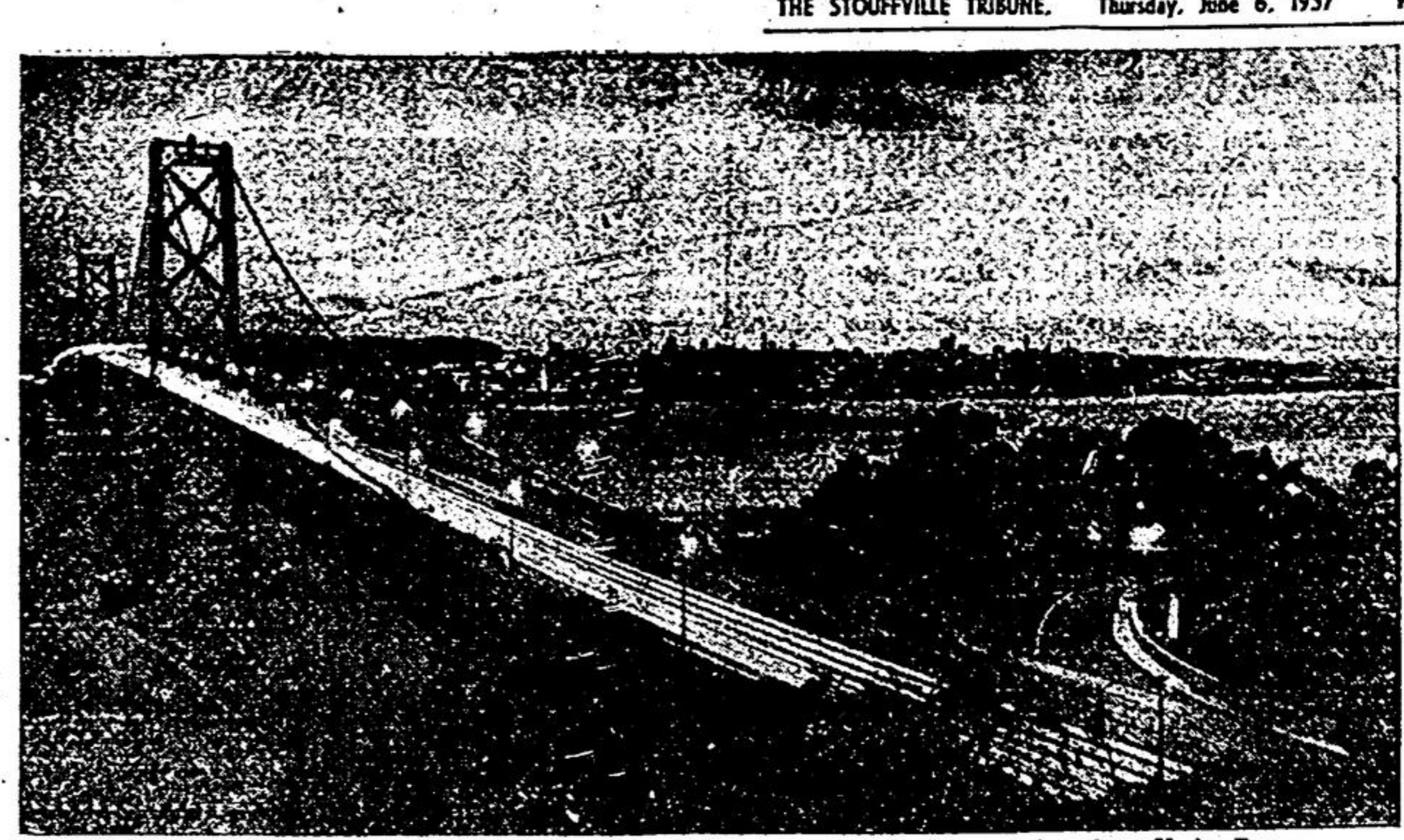

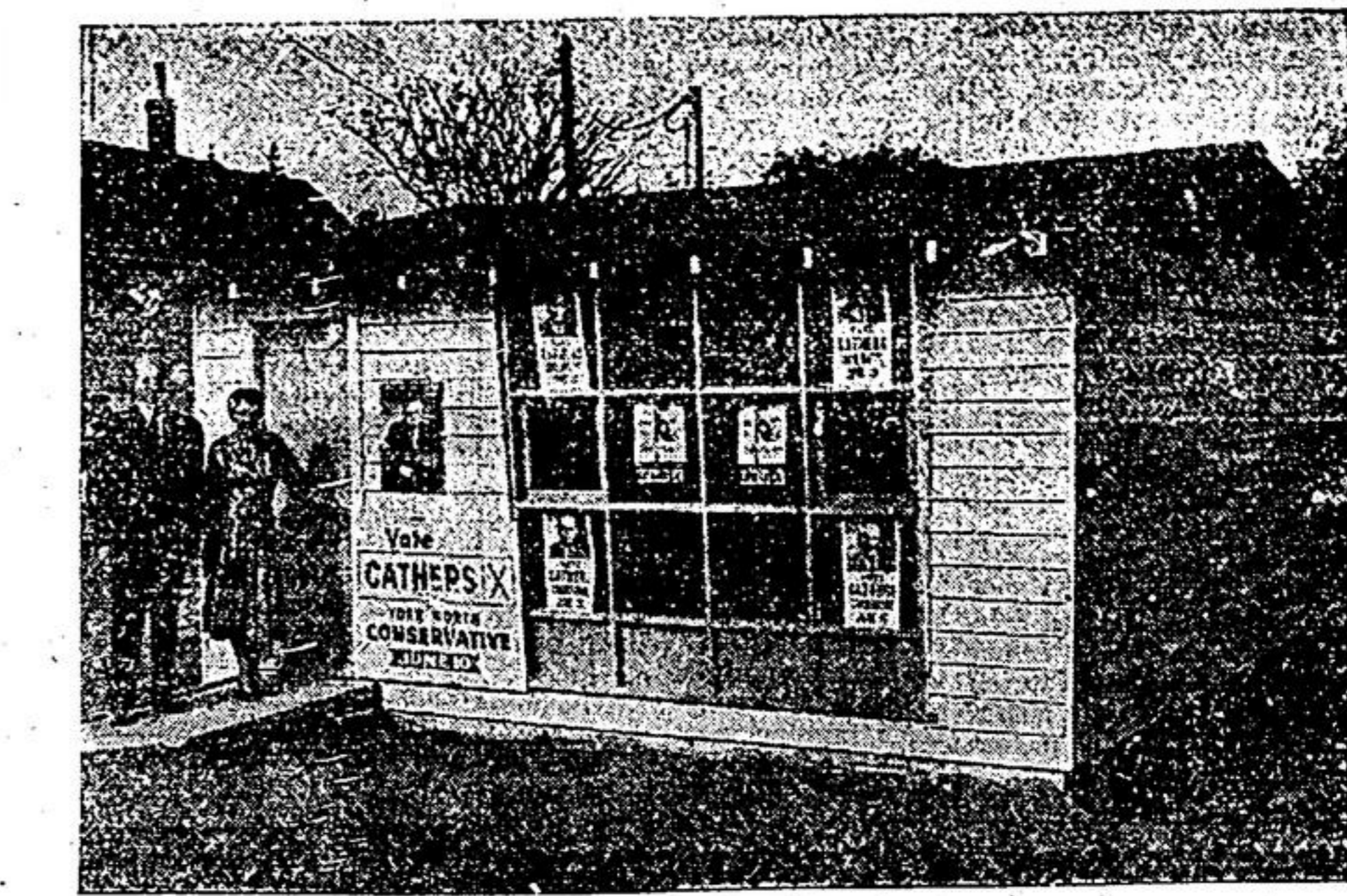
